Philadelphia Candies going on 100 years in business

A few minutes into a visit to Philadelphia Candies and you realize you're in chocolate heaven. The pungent, aromatic aroma of chocolate tempts shoppers with candies including chocolate covered nuts, chocolate covered fruits, chocolate covered potato chips, dark chocolates, chocolate bark, Croquettes, and the list goes on with dozens of varieties.

Philadelphia Candies, which started in 1919 in downtown Sharon by three Macris brothers, has been at its 1546 E. State St., Hermitage, location in the Philadelphia Candies Plaza since the 1960s. Its business name comes from the Greek word "philadelphia" and translates to candies "made with brotherly love."

Philadelphia's most popular item remains its Croquettes filled with either butter cream or peanut butter. The filled, chocolate-covered goodies are hand rolled with chopped peanuts.

"Fundamentally, we haven't changed any of our original recipes or the high quality of our products," says John Macris, director of business development. John, a great nephew of the company founders, is a graduate of Case Western Reserve University and Hickory High School.

John is proud not only of his quality chocolates but of Philadelphia's 50 employees, many of whom have long periods of service. For example, head candy maker, Michael Kifer, has 35 years with the company.

"We are very fortunate to have a lot of generational expertise in many departments," John adds.

A matcha green tea truffle is a new item resulting from John's candy-making interest. The matcha green tea, a popular item in the health food market, is imported from Japan.



In addition to the fine chocolates, Philadelphia also has a well-stocked gift shop with greeting cards and merchandise. It is the only store in the region offering Taylor Swift greeting cards. This spring it will offer Star Wars cards. Philadelphia works with numerous local organizations on fund raising projects through the year.

Coming Saturday, March 17 is its 29th Annual Chocolate Factory Tour. From 9 a.m.-4 p.m., patrons can tour production facilities on a self-guided basis at their own pace.

Along with its Hermitage facility, Philadelphia has stores in Boardman, OH, and Harrisburg. The Harrisburg store is owned and operated by Elena Macris, a sister of John.

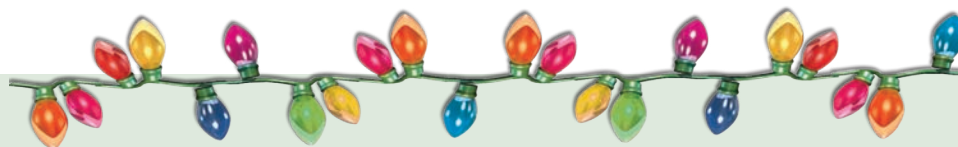

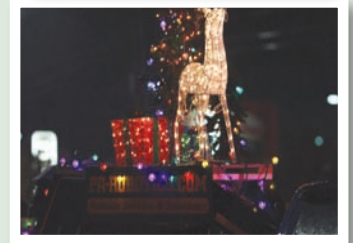

Canine Program Update

Officer Frampton and his K-9 partner Willem completed training and are on patrol and doing great. Despite the rainy weather, Officer Frampton showed off Willem during the Hermitage Holiday Light-Up Parade in November to thank all for their support. Willem has already sniffed out drugs in a number of

cases and has tracked a few criminals too.

Did you Know. . .

Hermitage Patrolman Anthony Moses is the school resource officer (SRO) for the Hermitage School District with an office at Hickory High School. Officer Moses has been serving the City of Hermitage since 1998 and has been the SRO for seven years. Officer Moses' primary duty is providing security and law and order operations in all District buildings and properties including the elementary

schools. His secondary duties include, but are not limited to, serving as an immediate liaison between Hermitage



police and the District, assisting with first responder medical aid, providing instruction to students on public safety related subjects and character advice, and serving as an advisor/instructor to staff and faculty on safety and security-related matters. Officer Moses completed formal SRO training from the National Association of School Resource Officers and is a certified ALICE (Alert – Lockdown – Inform – Counter – Evacuate) instructor for active shooter and school violence incidents. Officer Moses' primary security function is helping the District to provide a safe and secure learning environment for all students through his highly visible presence and physical security checks (inspecting doors, windows, hallways, parking lots, etc.). His primary law enforcement role is the prevention, detection and enforcement/prosecution of all crimes, particularly weapon offenses, drug and alcohol possessions and assaults. Officer Moses and the District work hard to keep your children safe every school day.

Crime Prevention

Curfew is a local law found in the City of Hermitage Code of Ordinances, Chapter 6 - Conduct, Part 1 – Curfew, Sections 101 -107. Generally, curfew for minors (persons under age 18) in public places in the City of Hermitage is from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and 12 midnight to 6 a.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. A public place is defined as any public street, alley, sidewalk, park, playground, public building or vacant lot. The curfew ordinance exists to protect the safety of minors at night, to protect the public from nocturnal mischief by minors and to reduce juvenile criminal activity during the hours of darkness. Hermitage police may take any minor into custody for violating curfew and hold them pending release to a parent or guardian. The minor may also receive a non-traffic citation, which can be up to \$600 in fines plus costs. A parent or guardian may not permit any minor to violate the curfew provisions without legal justification. Visit the Code of Ordinances at www.hermitage.net for curfew exceptions. In summary, some youth out late at night tend to cause trouble or trouble tends to find them. I ask parents and guardians to be mindful of the curfew ordinance, which helps make sure minors are where they're legally supposed to be at night, to keep our children and community safer.



Winter Safety Tips for Your Vehicle

Winter time is here. Remember to allow extra stopping time when following behind vehicles or approaching intersections plus allow extra

travel time to drive slower for winter road conditions. Brush the snow off your vehicle and give your windshield defrosters time to work before setting



out. Fill up your windshield wiper fluid reservoir and check the serviceability of your wiper blades to wipe away snow, dirt and salt. Check for good tread on your tires and keep adequate air pressure in them. Consider a new battery if yours is more than five years old as winter weather kills weak batteries in extreme cold. A little winter maintenance and prudent driving could save you time, money and your life.

The Hermitage Fire Department would like to wish everyone a happy and safe New Year. 2018 is shaping up to be an exciting year for the department with many plans and changes in store to better serve our community. I would also like to acknowledge the outstanding job our firefighters have done in 2017 for answering over 600 calls for help and assistance to our community. They are truly the pride of Hermitage.

The Hermitage Fire Department has mailed its annual truck fund drive letter out and encourages all of the Hermitage residences to support and donate no matter how big or small of a donation. These funds will help secure the future of the fire department with the best equipment possible.

As I travel around our community, I have noticed an alarming amount of businesses and residences without addresses on their homes or businesses. City of Hermitage Ordinance 9/8/1971; Chapter 4-103 states you must have at least a 3 inch in height number with the color contrasting with the background surface. It shall be affixed to the residence or building or structure at the assigned address and must be visible from the street. If street side mailboxes are used, the number



shall be affixed to the mailbox. Most of the time when you need some type of emergency services, time is of the most importance; why slow us down by not having an address visible. Trying to find an address in the darkness of the night can be like finding a needle in a hay stack. This year we will be addressing this issue and sending letters out to those in violation to the ordinance.

The Mercer County 911 Center is in the process of upgrading their CAD system. The new CAD system has many new features to better serve Mercer County and increase public safety. Before the CAD system can be put into service, someone has to drive around the communities and verify every address in Mercer County. If your property does not have a visible address that they can verify, this will slow down the new CAD system from being put into service and will make the process tougher. I cannot stress enough how important a visible address is for the safety and security for you and your loved ones. Please do your part as a safety advocate for our community and make sure your address is visible from the street.

Hello and Happy New Year!

All County/City tax bills will be sent on **March 1, 2018. Remember that it is your responsibility to inform the tax office if you did not receive your bill.** You will notice a small decrease on this bill due to the lowering of County mills from 24.4 in 2017 to 23.65 in 2018.

Also, keep in mind that those of you with taxes paid through escrow accounts, must forward your bills to your Mortgage Company. As a homeowner area, we are required to send tax bills directly to the homeowners and not the lenders. The lenders must have your bill before they can forward payment our office, or they are required to pay a \$10.00 duplicate bill fee to process your payment. The discount amounts on County/City taxes will be honored by our office through Monday, April 30.

The next tax bills go out on **August 1.** At that time you should receive both the School Tax bill and your Per Capita bill. If you annual

income falls under \$10,000.00 from all sources, with proof, there is an exoneration from part of the Per Capita.

This year, at the request of the auditors, separate checks for County/ City, School and Per Capita are needed for payment, and will be noted on your bills.

Once again we would like to let you know that our office is open to your questions and comments either in person, or by phone @ 724-347-4472. We will be happy to assist you whenever possible.

2018 Budgets Approved

On December 20, 2017 the Hermitage Board of Commissioners approved the City's 2018 budgets which total \$19.6M, including the General and Sewer Funds. There is no increase in taxes and staffing levels will be maintained. It is anticipated that revenues in 2018 will remain stable, enabling the City to sustain existing services and capital programs. City officials place a high priority on maintaining a sound infrastructure system. Several projects will be undertaken in 2018 including:

- **Phase V of Block 5** of the Neighborhood Investment Program. Lyle Dr. from Parkview Blvd. to Highland Rd. will have the old pavement milled off with roadway base repairs made and then repaved. Also, stormwater facilities will be improved and new street signs installed. Estimated cost - \$525,000.
- **The 2018 Capital Paving Program** will consist of paving Bonny Ln., Knapp Ave. and Baker Ave. (from E. State St. to a point 325 feet to the south). These streets will have the existing pavement milled off, necessary roadway base repairs made and new pavement and street signs installed. Elsewhere in the City several streets will be sealcoated and have line painting done, with the exact locations yet to be determined, under the City's AGILITY agreement with PENNDOT. Estimated cost - \$275,000.
- **The Valley View Rd. Culvert Replacement and Paving Project** will replace an existing culvert pipe under Valley View Rd., the roadway will have the existing pavement milled off, necessary roadway base repairs made and new street signs installed. The length of roadway to be paved will depend on bid prices and funds available. Estimated cost - \$320,000.
- **The Freedland Rd. Paving and Stormwater Improvement Project** will mill off existing pavement, make necessary roadway base repairs and pave the entire length of Freedland Rd. Also improvements will be made to the existing stormwater system and new street signs installed. Estimated cost - \$980,800.
- **Miscellaneous Stormwater Improvement Projects** will be completed on Easton Rd., Applewood Dr. and Avalon Dr. Estimated cost - \$55,000.
- **The Bobby Run MS4 Pollutant Reduction Plan** will have engineering work completed during the year with construction to occur in future years. Estimated cost - \$60,000 (engineering only).
- **The Hermitage Athletic Complex Phase III Project** will construct two additional open play fields at the complex for multiple uses and expand the trail system. Estimated cost - \$270,000 (funded through a state grant and City funds).
- **Traffic Signals** at Buhl Farm Dr. and E. State St. and at N. Hermitage Rd. and the Indian Run Rd./SV Mall entrance will be upgraded under a state grant.

Other capital expenditures include new vehicles for the Inspection/Code Enforcement Office, facility improvements at the City Garage, new police vehicles, new computers in the Finance, Street and Fire Depts. and capital facility maintenance improvements at Fire Station #1 and the Municipal Building.

City Receives \$175,000 Grant for expansion at the Hermitage Athletic Complex ♦ ♦ ♦ ♦ ♦

The City of Hermitage has received a \$175,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Commonwealth Finance Authority – Greenways, Trails & Recreation Program. The grant will help pay for construction of additional multi-purpose fields and trails at the Hermitage Athletic Complex on South Darby Road. The plan calls for adding two large open play fields just north of softball field #1, with trail connections to the complex and existing parking facilities. The new fields are intended to be available for use by youth sports programs in the community, like soccer & football, along with other activities and programs. These

additional facilities will enhance recreational opportunities in the community by adding more play fields to the complex that already has two softball fields, one large multi-purpose field, concession stand, parking facilities and road network. It is anticipated construction will begin later this year and the fields will be available for use by mid-2019.

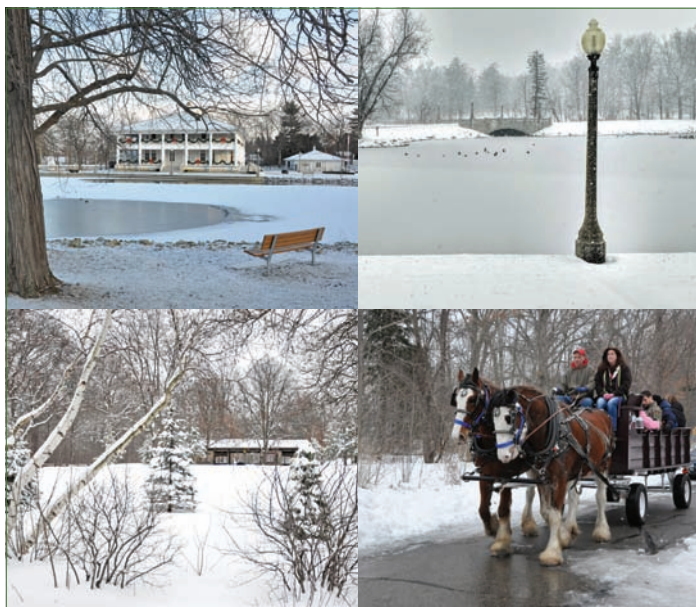

Trees in your yard and community protect water and soil resources. Trees reduce the amount of runoff and pollutants in creeks, ponds and other receiving waters in three primary ways:

- Surfaces of leaves, branches and trunks intercept and store rainfall, thereby reducing the amount of runoff, soil erosion, and delaying the onset of peak flows.
- Root growth and decomposition of organic matter increase the capacity and rate of infiltration of rainfall into the soil and reduce surface flow.
- The tree's system recycles rainfall back into the atmosphere as evaporation.
