Toss'd Italian Bar & Grille and Trendy open in the former Jess's building


The owners of Toss'd Italian Bar & Grille will make it a popular gathering place at its new location of 3640 East State Street. Toss'd was first established on South Hermitage Road (Rt. 18) in 2016 to provide the Valley with new, fresh food options. The business thrived and planning for expansion in the new location started in early 2018.

Owners Summer Wise and Jeff Layman saw an opportunity to redevelop an existing landmark in the community with a new industrial, urban feel. Constructed in 1952, the original structure previously housed a craft supply shop and beer distributor prior to Jess's.

The new café not only has an eye-catching look and inviting atmosphere, but a new and expanded menu to accommodate a wide variety of appetites. The menu has 35 new choices from small bites at the bar and entrees of steaks and fresh seafood, to vegan and gluten-free selections. Toss'd Italian Bar & Grille has options for all tastes.

Toss'd opened April 17 while a women's boutique, Trendy, opened in January. Wise combined other Trendy stores in Hermitage and Boardman, OH, into the new location of about 1,000 sq. ft.

The restaurant's larger dining areas, bar and welcoming patio seating make it an exciting gathering location. Toss'd increased in size to 4,000 sq. ft. Employees total 30, up from 12.



Women-business-owners is a group Summer hopes to promote and work with in the new ventures. She also plans to host a Team Danielle event on May 7.

The City of Hermitage Community and Economic Development Commission provided assistance from the City's Revolving Loan Program towards the renovations.

"Jeff and I give a huge thank you to Gary Hinkson and Gary Gulla for their continued support of the project," said Summer. "They played a crucial role in getting the project complete. Not only did they offer the economic development loan, they helped each step of the way to move the project along."

Summer and Jeff envisioned the potential of the property and now get to see it with their own eyes and share it with the community.

If indeed it's true that good things come to those who wait, the new venture for Summer and Jeff will be a raging success.

- Applications must include fee. Please make checks payable to City of Hermitage.
- Application fee is \$50 per 10'x10' display space. Electricity fee is an additional \$10.
- All Artists must exhibit their own, original work; all items must be handcrafted. Only the types of items indicated on the application form may be sold.
- No flea market or commercially produced items will be permitted.
- At least three photos (no slides) of work to be displayed must be submitted. Acceptance is up to the committee's discretion. If possible, at least one photo should represent the overall look of your display booth.
- Space will be assigned according to art category, variety of artwork sold, and on a first-come, first-serve basis. Application fee is non-refundable for cancellations received after June 14, 2019.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own displays and must furnish their own tables, table coverings, chairs, and any extension cords for electricity.
- All exhibitors must be set up for the two days of the event. Set up is 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 13, and 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Sunday, July 14.
- No early breakdowns permitted. Teardown permitted only after show hours.



New eCenter Executive Director Takes the Reins

Jeff Meier has been on the cusp of technological change throughout his career and worked with many entrepreneurs.

"A number of people that were in my group over the years ventured out with the ideas that we developed inside, and they went out and started their own companies, and then we would, at times, engage with them," said Meier, the Sharon native who has taken on the duties as executive director of the eCenter@LindenPointe in Hermitage. "That's my experience with the world of incubators and accelerators."

The eCenter, located in the LindenPointe Innovative Business Campus on South Hermitage Road, was created by the city of Hermitage as a business incubator for technology-related firms. The companies rent space from the eCenter but receive mentoring and guidance from business and industry professionals, who help them develop their products and learn about bread-and-butter business practices and requirements.

The eCenter also runs an accredited program for high school seniors, the eAcademy, which teaches students business, entrepreneurial and leadership skills; exposes them to real-world business operations; and develops reasoning, problem-solving, communication and task management skills.

The city created the LindenPointe Development Corp. to run the eCenter.

When former Executive Director Ketaki Desai resigned last year, board members Frank Mindicino and Richard W. Epstein approached Meier, who also knew board member Bob Evans, Meier said.

"The LindenPointe Board of Directors' goal was to find the smartest, most innovative, experienced individual to execute its strategic plan of creating sustainable jobs and retaining talent in our region, and Jeff Meier, our new CEO, definitely fits the bill," Epstein said. "In fact, since January of this year Jeff has already made significant contributions."

Those contributions include contacting regional college presidents to talk about current and future commitments, contacting business leaders "driving new ideas and possible innovations," and extending the "College Connector" program, which seeks to match new college graduates with local businesses, Epstein said.

Meier is translating "great ideas into great results," Epstein said.

"The eCenter Board is very excited to have an individual of Jeff's talent, experience and intelligence to be our CEO and is confident that, with community support and resources, Jeff will be the catalyst for connecting our region's great colleges with our region's great businesses through educating, innovating, and transforming," Epstein said.

Meier is working as a volunteer for the eCenter on a part-time basis while he completes his duties with Fujitsu, one of the

top information technology companies in the world. Working at Fujitsu's Dallas office, Meier is senior vice president and Americas chief information officer.

At a time that has yet to be determined, he will become a full-time eCenter director.

Meier said he has ideas to expand the eCenter's offerings, one of which is to bring universities and businesses together under the auspices of the eCenter to create a shared-services approach to cybersecurity.

"There is a major problem in all the United States," he said. "We have over 330,000 open positions for cybersecurity. Our colleges can't produce enough of these young professionals to enter that market. Some of the colleges in the nation, as soon as they graduate, they're snatched up. I see it all the time in the Dallas area."

Other colleges struggle to find the resources to offer cybersecurity programs, he said.

"We're hoping, by bringing the universities together and building this alliance, that we can share some resources and make this the hub for that, which in turn should help some of the local business, because they also are having trouble finding these critical resources for this region," Meier said.

He also would like to create a capstone program in which area university students work on real-life business problems that local businesses encounter, and receive college credit for their work.

"These programs that we're talking about, they will only enhance the ability of supporting the incubator program," Meier said.

The eCenter's incubator suites are just about full, and this aspect of the eCenter will remain the "primary drive" of the eCenter, Meier said.

Meier started transitioning into the eCenter post in November. He has a number of projects and tasks to complete at Fujitsu before his

tenure there is over, and is hopping back and forth between Dallas and Sharon, where he also has a home.

"We live in a virtual world," he said. "When I have availability in Texas, I'm able to work on stuff for the eCenter."

Meier has embraced changes in the business world throughout his career. While earning a bachelor's degree in finance at Penn State, he realized that the nature of finance was evolving.

"When I saw how financial systems were being groomed and how the industry was

changing when I was at Penn State, I got very into taking a number of information technology/computer science courses that helped me understand how finance is going to be a digitized discipline in the future," he said.

After graduation, he got work as a programmer, but did not leave his finance training behind.

"At that time, most large companies were developing in-house their own business systems," Meier said. "The age of ERP (enterprise resource planning), of the (software makers) SAPs and Oracles of the world didn't exist yet in the '80s. I got heavily involved in becoming a programmer, understanding my background was in finance, to develop those for the companies I worked for."

Being present at the creation of business systems and how technology was changing them "was very exciting," Meier said. "I moved from a programmer to programmer analyst to

systems analyst and I was able to work right with the business community on what they were looking for."

He sought additional training from Kent State University and Clemson University in South Carolina before finally earning a master's degree from Vanderbilt University, Nashville.

Meier worked for a handful of companies, large and small, before landing at Fujitsu in 1997.

Meier said he could imagine a much different career path for himself if the eCenter had existed when he was growing up.

"Maybe, I could have stayed in the area," he said. "When I graduated from high school, this area was in a transition period. It was very heavy industry. When I got out of Penn State, there was not the opportunities. I had to move away. Something like this, I would have liked to think I certainly would have taken advantage of the eAcademy opportunities. I think it could have been a big difference for me."



2019 City of Hermitage Street/ Storm Water Projects



2019 Neighborhood Investment Program

Work will begin in late April on Block 6, Phase I of the Neighborhood Investment Program. Work is scheduled to be completed by late summer. The project includes Carroll Lane from South Hermitage Road to Michael Lane and Michael Lane from Carroll Lane to Armand Avenue. Work includes storm water improvements, limited new curbing, removal of existing pavement, repairs to the roadway base where necessary and the repaving of the streets. Also, new street signs will be installed. The construction contract has been awarded to Stateline Paving, Inc. Total cost for Phase I is estimated to be \$680,000.



South Darby Road Improvement Project

This project involves the installation of new storm water facilities, removal of existing pavement, repairs to the roadway base where necessary and repaving of the street. The work will be done between Virginia Road and Miller Road. The project is currently in final design with construction anticipated to begin in late June and the project completed by late summer. Estimated cost is \$500,000.

Traffic Safety Tip:

As the warmer weather quickly approaches please be extra mindful while

travelling our neighborhood streets, business highways and rural roadways as people will be out and about more enjoying the much awaited season change. Due to the increased outside activity in warm weather, please focus more of your attention on the road. Avoid distractions like casual cellphone use, looking for that lost item, grooming and of course never text while driving. Watch for children, runners, walkers, bicyclists, motorcyclists or more. Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks, share the road with bicycles, look twice for motorcycles, give runners and walkers plenty of passing space, slow down for children at play and yield to blind persons with a clearly visible white cane or guide dog. In the rural areas don't forget to slow down on approach for horseback riders and slow moving farm tractors. Lastly, road construction season always comes with springtime. In construction zones turn on your headlights, obey reduced speed limits and always watch for flaggers and workers, slowing or stopped traffic, changing traffic lanes or patterns, and moving equipment.

Crime Prevention Tip:

Always roll up your windows and lock your vehicle whether it's parked in your driveway, on the street or in a parking lot. Petty thieves are always looking for an easy mark – an unlocked vehicle. Thieves will walk neighborhoods or parking lots discretely checking door handles for unlocked doors or windows left rolled down. Unlocked vehicles or down car windows tempt and easily permit thieves to rummage through glove boxes, console storage locations, jackets,

shopping bags, purses, etc. looking for cash or change, credit cards, nice sunglasses, jewelry, phones, etc. Determined thieves will risk being seen or heard breaking into a locked vehicle if valuables are visible in plain sight. If you must keep valuable items in your vehicle such as purses and wallets, phones, cash, shopping bags of merchandise, etc. make sure you store them in a locked glove box or console compartment or out of sight like the trunk or hidden under a seat or under something on the back seat floor, etc. Thieves may break a window or pop a lock with a tool to get in for a guaranteed good score (valuables in plain sight). Always call police if you discover items were stolen out of your vehicle.

For Your Information:

Per City Ordinance, Chapter 13, Part 3, door to door solicitation is permitted in Hermitage. For your safety all door to door solicitation can only be lawfully conducted after a license is issued by the City of Hermitage Police Department (HPD) and only between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. No Sunday or legal holiday solicitation is allowed except by prior appointment. If a salesperson knocks at your door, ask to see his/her Hermitage transient business license. The license must be in the individual's name and must be current. It is highly recommended residents not do any business with any unlicensed persons, and notify HPD of any unlawful sales activity immediately. Though applicants are screened for active arrest warrants and their names reviewed for local derogatory information, additional prudence (caution) should be exercised as to whether or not you allow any stranger into your home or provide any personal information. Don't forget the old adage of 'buyer beware' still applies. Do not rush to buy or sign up for anything. Research the company online or ask for literature to read and ponder before making any decision. Be leery of pressure, fast talk or promotional offers of big savings if you act

now. You may be asked to enter into a civil contract. As with any contract you should carefully read and understand all terms and conditions of the agreement before signing up. License issuance by the City is not a product or service endorsement by the City.

From the Fire Chief's Desk

It's that time of the year again when everyone wants to clean-up their yards from last fall and winter. As a reminder, the

City of Hermitage has a burning ordinance. You are only allowed to burn between 6 a.m. and noon Monday through Saturday. Burning is not allowed on Sundays or holidays. You are also not allowed to burn leaves or trash, only Class A materials such as sticks, paper or cloth. The burning must be contained in a burn barrel and the fire must always be attended by an adult. You are also not allowed to burn during windy days. This is the major cause of out-of-control brush and grass fires. For a copy of the burning ordinance contact the Hermitage Fire Station:

Many of our residences have noticed and commented seeing the Fire Marshals at different business around our community and asking us "Why?". Part of our job as a Fire Marshal is to conduct life and safety inspections at commercial businesses within the City of Hermitage. The major goals of fire inspections include the following: to raise the owner's awareness of fire safety considerations in their place of business, to identify fire hazards that must be eliminated for a safer environment, and to verify the proper functioning/maintenance of installed fire protection systems and other building fire protection equipment/features. We check things like means of egress, fire extinguishers, sprinkler systems, fire suppression systems, electrical systems, storage areas, emergency exit signs, emergency lighting, etc.

Our fire inspections are geared toward motivating owners and tenants to correct



detected violations, protect against future violations, and most importantly maintain fire-safe premises. The City of Hermitage adopted the International Fire Code which is a comprehensive fire prevention code used throughout the United States.

It is the mission of the Fire Marshal's Office to prevent and/or reduce the incidence of fire by increasing the awareness and knowledge of fire safety to the residents and businesses of our community. The Fire Marshal's office is working hand in hand with our local businesses, "partnering up", to create a safer environment for your family and friends. Please thank our business owners for doing their part in making their facilities safer.

From the Desk of Treasurer

It looks like Spring has sprung! Welcome to all the new residents of Hermitage. Just a reminder that tax bills are mailed twice a year. The County/City portion of your real estate bill goes out on March 1st of each year. There is no change for 2019 in your County/City bill. County remains at 23.65 mills and the City holds at 5 mills. The school bill along with the per capita bills are mailed on August 1st. I'd like to explain the note on your bills stating that we need separate checks for each bill.

Your County/City bill is one combined bill requiring only one check for the entire total amount due. Should you own more than one parcel, all of those County/City bills may be made payable with one check if you so choose.

School bills require a separate check as do your County/City, and Per Capita bills. Again,

like bills may be combined but different bills cannot!

If you have never applied for the Homestead exemption, you should do so as soon as possible. You can download the form from the county website or pick one up in our office at your convenience.

You only apply one time unless you change your deed or purchase a new house. Remember you may only collect the discount once. Your name must be on the deed and that parcel must be your residence. For example if you have a home here and a vacation home or rental property, you cannot receive the exemption on anything except your main residence. So if this pertains to you, please contact our office.

If you are new to the area, whether you rent or own your home, you must register with

the City for per capita billing. Per Capita tax is a \$35.00 head tax levied on anyone over the age of 18, living in the City of Hermitage.

Also, we are asking all rentals to register with our office even if a family member is living in that house. This information is necessary to update our City census.
