Cucina di Cianci's dishes authentic Italian cuisine at 489 S. Hermitage Rd.

Authentic Italian cuisine and heartfelt family traditions are on the menu at Cucina di Cianci's. From its beginning over 70 years ago in Greenville, to its opening three years ago at 489 S. Hermitage Rd., Hermitage, the Cianci family brought its American dream from the Abruzzi region of east central Italy.

"We are so very grateful to the community for their support," says Chris Cianci, CRNP. "We opened our business in Hermitage during very shaky times with COVID. Thankfully, due to amazing community support, we have been able to weather that storm and continue to do what we love to do and share our great Italian food with the community!"

Cam Cianci II and his wife Chris started the South Hermitage Road venture as a return to their previous restaurant in Greenville, while

bringing in son, Cam III, to learn the business and someday possibly carry on the family tradition.

Cam II had extensive restaurant experience that started after college in the 1980's working for Sanray as a restaurant manager at several Perkin's restaurants, then buying into the family business, Cianci's Restaurant and Motel, in Greenville in 1992.

Due to complications of COVID, Cam II passed away in February 2021. This was a tremendous loss for the family and friends as well as the community. Chris and Cam III were determined to keep the late Cam II legacy alive and keep the business running. With much hard work and dedication, the business has continued to thrive.

Cam III now puts in many hours in the kitchen and running the general operations of the restaurant. Chris

oversees operations and provides support to her son and the restaurant, while maintaining her position as Director of Campus Health and Wellness Services at Thiel College.

Along with about a dozen employees, they concoct Cianci's Italian menu with hints of the Abruzzi region. Sausage gnocchi, lasagna, and lobster linguine top Cianci's most popular items, says Cam III. Other selections include a variety of pastas, pizzas, Italian fried greens, soups, salads and boneless wings with a choice of 15 sauces. Codfish is a Friday feature.

TERMS & CONDITIONS

- Applications must include fee. Please make checks payable to City of Hermitage.
- Application fee is \$50 per 10'x10' booth space. Electricity fee is an additional \$10.
- All Artists must exhibit their own, original work; all items must be handcrafted. Only the types of items indicated on the application form may be sold.
- No flea market or commercially produced items will be permitted.
- At least three photos (no slides) of work to be displayed must be submitted. Acceptance is up to the committee's discretion. If possible, at least one photo should represent the overall look of your display booth.
- Space will be assigned according to art category, variety of artwork sold, and on a first-come, first-serve basis. Application fee is non-refundable for cancellations received after July 14, 2023.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own displays and must furnish their own tables, table coverings, chairs, and any extension cords for electricity.
- All exhibitors must be set up for the two days of the event. Set up is 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 29, and 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Sunday, July 30.
- No early breakdowns permitted. Teardown permitted only after show hours.
- Instructions for unloading and parking area designation for exhibitors will be available at the registration booth.
- Proper insurance and protection of work and displays are the responsibility of the artist. Hermitage Arts Festival will not be responsible for damage to work or display due to weather or unrelated incidents. Security will be provided overnight.



Health Education Scholarships

Character Strong Hits Ionta and Delahunty Schools in 2022

I have had the honor and privilege of working within the Hermitage School District for the past 28 years. I am excited to have this wonderful opportunity to share exciting news regarding school happenings occurring at both Ionta and Delahunty Schools, grades four through seven, in the Hermitage School District.

We have many great programs throughout our school district in grades K-12, and I am pleased to describe one in particular, which is our social-emotional learning curriculum called Character Strong. Schools across the country have always sought out ways to help students improve their academic performance, increase their attendance rate and, ultimately, graduate high school. To date, that same belief holds true for our schools, but with the impact of the pandemic, we are also faced with the added emphasis of helping students deal with stress, resolving conflicts, developing relationships, respecting others' opinions and more. Now, more than ever, our teachers, support staff, school counselors, and administrators must focus on the whole student. Our students' social and emotional well-being are vital for healthy maturation, growth and development.



The Character Strong curricula is a research-based curriculum designed with an intentional focus on the development of competencies that include: self awareness, social awareness, self management, responsible decision making and relationship skills for all students. It helps students to understand and manage life tasks, and know how to adapt to challenges and expectations in life. Five key components of the Character Strong curriculum places an emphasis on the following:

- **Emotion Understanding & Regulation:** How We Feel & How We Act
- **Empathy & Compassion:** What We Understand & How We Care
- **Values & Purpose:** Who We Are & What We Do
- **Goals & Habits:** The Dreams We Have & The Actions Necessary To Get There
- **Leadership & Teamwork:** Developing Responsibility & Working Together

With the implementation of the Character Strong program, we are encouraged and confident that all students will have an improved set of skills that supports individual student well-being, a deepening of academic student involvement and an improvement in student attendance. We want all students to feel a deep sense of belonging to their school community.

Spotlight 8th Grade: Gateway to High School

Eighth grade is an exciting year in the Hermitage School District. This is the time when students begin attending classes at Hickory High School. The administration, faculty and staff at HHS understand the importance of this transition and the "student jitters" that accompany it, and have developed programming and activities to help students make this move in a comfortable and successful manner.

The transition begins with a visit to HHS at the end of the seventh grade year. This is an organized event that allows the students to meet the eighth grade administration, faculty and staff; to visit classrooms and tour the building and grounds; and to meet a variety of upperclassmen. It also provides the opportunity to ask questions; gather information about athletics, the arts and other activities; and to hear current eighth grade students address frequently asked questions and share personal reflections relating to their own "pre-eighth grade" anxieties.

In August, students and their families have the opportunity to become familiar with 8th grade



personnel, class room locations and expectations of their new school by attending a combined eighth grade orientation/open house. The goal of this program is that students will leave the evening with a feeling of confidence about the upcoming year.

Each month of school, eighth grade students have the opportunity to be nominated for the Fantastic Four. This is a program that is based around the character words-of-the-month developed from the District's Character Strong social-emotional learning curriculum: September: **Conduct**; October: **Selflessness**; November: **Respect**; January: **Patience**; February: **Honesty**; March: **Forgiveness**; April: **Commitment**. On a monthly basis, faculty who teach eighth grade select students who they believe best exemplify the essence of these words. A committee of teachers then meets to determine the four student winners from those who were nominated. In an effort to recognize this honor, Fantastic Four students have the opportunity to meet with the principal and school counselor to discuss eighth grade-related issues, have their pictures placed in a dedicated display case and are presented with several award items. In May, all Fantastic Four students are treated to a celebratory lunch.

The eighth grade class maintains their own Student Council. Any student who gathers 15 signatures from their peers can be a member of the group. Once the Council is set, the participants elect their officers. The



Student Council conducts a variety of activities including eighth grade fundraising, planning of special theme days and coordination of class activities and events. One such event is wrapping Christmas gifts alongside HHS Students for Charity.

The majority of eighth grade classrooms are on the 3rd floor of the high school. This hallway is unique as it has a Learning Lounge that contains an eighth grade library. Teachers and students enjoy using this room as a resource to the traditional classroom and find it a quiet place to study and read.



Eighth grade is the final year that students remain largely together as a class. From Kindergarten through eighth grade, the dynamics of

activities and functions are predominantly by grade level, thus promoting a closeness and friendship between the students. Eighth grade students participate in a variety of

fundraising events with a portion of the proceeds going toward one last, much anticipated, year end whole-class activity.

The Hermitage School District is extremely fortunate to be a part of an active and supportive community. Because our doors remained open and our staff made simultaneous in-person and virtual learning possible during the 20-21 school year, we know that we lessened the impact of the pandemic for the students in our District. One way this is evident is based on the state assessment scores from last spring. We continue to outperform statewide averages on our PSSA Testing. Our district average proficiency over the statewide averages are:

English Language Arts ... +16.1%

Mathematics + 17.9%

Science +13.2%

With that being said, we know that we still have work to do, as the pandemic impacted our children in various ways. Finally, we have hired a school social worker this fall through a grant as an additional resource to children and families.

As 2023 begins, we are excited about the daily experiences we provide our students, and we are thankful to do so with the support of the Hermitage community.



Pandemic Tax Credit Available to Most Businesses



The federal Employee Retention Tax Credit (ERC) provides up to \$26,000 in tax credits to many businesses, including tax-exempt

organizations, per full-time employee on the payroll, yet only about 10% of small businesses have applied for these tax credits. As a refundable tax credit, this is money that businesses can receive even if they don't have to pay federal taxes. While it relates to tax years 2020 and 2021, businesses have up until three years from the tax filing deadline for those years to file an amended return and claim the tax credit. Businesses should discuss the ERC program with their accountants or tax professionals, and should also recognize that not all such professionals are knowledgeable about the program.

The ERC was another federal program designed to encourage employers to retain employees during the pandemic, and it also recognized the financial hardship businesses endured during the pandemic. The program considers wages, and qualified health plan expenses, paid to full-time employees for each quarter of employment from March 13, 2020 (the beginning of the pandemic) through December 31, 2020, for the 2020 tax year, and for the first three quarters of the 2021 tax year (January 1, 2021 through September 30,

2021). Full-time employees are those who worked at least 30 hours/week and 130 hours/month. Majority owners of a business, and their close relatives, are excluded from being considered full-time employees.

There are different rules of eligibility for businesses in regard to tax year 2020 versus 2021, and different levels of tax credits for those years. For both years, businesses need to either show a "significant decline in gross receipts" or they must have experienced a full or partial suspension of their business operations due to a governmental order. However, for 2020, a significant decline in gross receipts is a decline of 50% or more as compared to the same quarter in 2019; while for 2021 it is a decline of 20% or more as compared to the same quarter in 2019. If business eligibility is instead based upon a full or partial suspension of business operations due to a governmental order, the standards for both 2020 or 2021 are the same. If the business was completely shutdown during quarters of those tax years, due to a government order, eligibility is clear. A partial shutdown, which is less clear, could be caused by government orders restricting restaurants to takeout only, or outdoor dining and takeout only, for example, and, for other businesses, government orders that affected commerce, travel, group meetings, etc.

The tax credit level for 2020 is up to \$5,000/full-time employee on the payroll. It is calculated as one-half of the wages paid to the employee for the first \$10,000 in wages. For 2021, the tax

credit is calculated quarterly and is up to \$7,000/full-time employee on the payroll/quarter. In this case, it is 70% of the wages paid to the employee for the first \$10,000 in wages, but per quarter. In 2020, businesses with 100 or fewer full-time employees can count wages paid even if the employee worked, while those over 100 employees may only count employees retained on the payroll who didn't work. For 2021, that threshold is increased to 500 full-time employees.

Businesses that began operations after February 15, 2020, known as "recovery startup businesses", may also be eligible for tax credits for the third and fourth quarters of 2021, as long as these businesses have annual gross receipts of less than \$1 million. For these businesses, the tax credit is capped at \$50,000 per quarter.

While the tax credit payments are not subject to federal taxation, businesses will need to file amended tax returns to reduce their business payroll deduction by the amount of the credits. The resulting increased tax liability will be a small fraction of the benefit received through the tax credits, however. Additionally, businesses should know that they cannot use the ERC to "double dip". For example, they cannot count the same wages for the ERC benefit that they counted for receiving a forgivable Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan/grant and they cannot count the same wages that were paid by a Restaurant Revitalization Program grant.

Water Quality Corner

The City of Hermitage is committed to protecting and improving stream & river quality in our community and region.

When discussing polluted waterways, there are two types of pollutants: point source & non point source pollutants. When there is a direct water contamination issue that can be followed, that is considered point source pollution. Nonpoint source pollution includes cars leaking motor oil, littering, and fertilizer use. These items, along with many others, are sources of pollution that greatly impact the health of our waterways and can lead to long last effects including fish kills and hazards to human health.

It's the new year and we would like to welcome the new Hermitage residents! Our office is open to the public from 8:00a.m. to 4:00p.m., Monday through Friday except legal holidays, and you can reach us by phone or e-mail with any concerns you may have.

Just a reminder that tax bills are mailed twice a year. The County/City portion of your real estate bill goes out on **March 1st** of each year. As you may have noticed, there is no change for 2023 in your County/City bill. The school bill along with the per capita bills are mailed on **August 1st**. If you do not receive your bills around the mailing dates, please notify us and keep in mind that it is the home-owners responsibility to know the due dates of taxes.

I'd like to explain the note on your bills stating that we need separate

checks for each bill.

Your County/City bill is one combined bill requiring only one check for the total amount due. Should you own more than one parcel, all County/City bills may be made payable with one check if you so choose. School bills require a separate check as do your County/City, and Per Capita bills. Again, like bills may be combined but different bills cannot!

Whether you rent or own your home, you must register with the city for per capita tax billing. Per Capita tax is a head tax levied on anyone over the age of 18, living in the City of Hermitage. It remains at \$30.00 per person.

Remember, when making payments, it is not necessary to come in, you can mail your payment or leave it in the secure drop box on the north side

The Hermitage Volunteer Fire Department would like to wish everyone a happy and safe New Year. The Fire Department has mailed its annual truck fund drive letter out and encourages all Hermitage residences to support and donate, no matter how big or small, to this worthwhile fundraiser. These funds will help secure the future of the fire department with the best equipment possible. We thank you in advance for your generous donation.

The Fire Marshal's Office wants everyone to stay safe and warm during winter weather and offers the following safety tips on how to best care for yourself and your family when temperatures plummet:



Protect Yourself:

- Dress in several layers of lightweight clothing, which will keep you warmer than a single heavy coat.
- Mittens provide more warmth to your hands than gloves.
- Wear a hat, preferably one that covers your ears.
- Wear waterproof, insulated boots to keep your feet warm and dry and to maintain your footing in ice and snow.
- If working outside, take frequent breaks and stay hydrated.

Protect yourself at Home:

- Be careful with candles – do not use candles for lighting if the power goes out. Use flashlights only.
- Use generators correctly – never operate a generator inside your home, including the basement,

garage or porch. Run the generator as far away from the house as possible and point the exhaust away from open doors and windows to avoid potential carbon monoxide poisoning.

- Install and/or check carbon monoxide detectors.
- Prevent frozen pipes - when the weather is very cold outside, open cabinet doors to let warm air circulate around water pipes. Let the cold-water drip from the faucet served by exposed pipes. Running water through the pipe - even at a trickle - helps prevent pipes from freezing.
- Never attempt to thaw pipes using a blow torch or any open flame device. Use warm water or a UL-listed device such as a hand-held hair dryer.
- Keep the thermostat set to a consistent temperature.
- Check smoke alarms once a month by pressing the test button and replace batteries as necessary.
- Don't forget your pets. If you can't bring them inside, provide adequate shelter to keep them warm and make sure they can get to unfrozen water.
- If you plan on using an alternate



heating source, never use a stove or oven to heat your home.

- Keep a glass or metal fire screen around the fireplace and never leave a fireplace fire unattended.
- If using a space heater, follow the manufacturer's instructions on how to safely use the heater. Place it on a level, hard, nonflammable surface. Turn the space heater off when you leave the room or go to sleep. Keep children and pets away from your space heater and do not use it to dry wet clothing. Plug the space heater directly into a wall receptacle, never plug into an extension cord or multi-plug strip.

Another safety tip for winter; always carry a jacket or warm clothing when traveling, even if you are going to the local store. If you happen to be involved in a motor vehicle accident or your vehicle breaks down, hypothermia can come on fast while you are waiting for help. Be prepared for the unexpected.
