Pita a Sandwich Stop is more than pitas

Pita a Sandwich Stop is much more than simply pitas at its location of 2560 E. State St., Hermitage, across State Street from Kraynak's.

Along with numerous pita sandwiches, the family-owned-and-operated restaurant's extensive menu includes salads, fresh cut French fries, rice bowls, and smoothies.

"All our food items are made fresh daily," says Abdou Saada, owner along with wife, Elyse. "We are building a brand with fresh foods and establishing a relationship with our customers and the community."

Traditional Middle Eastern favorite pitas include the gyro with either lamb or chicken, feta cheese, lettuce, tomato, onion, and cucumber sauce, and the "meaty garbanzo" with chicken, red pepper hummus, grilled green peppers, onions, portabella mushrooms, chickpeas, lettuce, tomato, and feta cheese.

Pitas with only vegetables are available, too.

The Saadas bought the building in 2018, completely renovated it and opened almost two years ago. Originally Mr. C's diner in the 1960s, the Hermitage restaurant is like the couple's New Castle pita stop on Grove Street it opened in 2016.

"We have invested our love and sweat into creating an environment where community members can come to fill their bellies with fresh food, while enjoying a relaxed space," says Elyse. "As a Mom and Pop shop, we developed our menu to assist with different tastes and to hopefully make you smile. We can't wait to get to know you."

The Saadas also are involved with New Castle restaurant, Elham Middle Eastern Cuisine, 2001 E. Washington Street.

Public Meetings Held as Part of Wheatland Merger

On January 1, 2024, the Borough of Wheatland will officially merge into the City of Hermitage following overwhelming public support for the merger by voters in both communities at the November 2022 General Election. As both communities work to implement the merger, a series of public meetings have been held to explain how the merger will affect residents and businesses and to gain input for a new Zoning Map that will be adopted to incorporate Wheatland properties into the Hermitage Zoning Ordinance.

On August 16th, a public meeting of Wheatland residents was held at the Wheatland Borough Building and was well attended. Various Hermitage officials were introduced and an explanation of the merger process as well as a profile of the Hermitage form of government were provided to residents. Property owners were informed that their municipal property taxes would decrease by 80% due to the much lower Hermitage property tax rate (5 mills vs. the Wheatland rate of 24.75 mills), while the earned income tax, paid on wages earned, would increase some to 2.25% from the Wheatland rate of 1.5%. It was also explained that the merger does not affect school district boundaries, in accordance with Pennsylvania law, so children in the Wheatland area would still be within the attendance boundaries of the Farrell Area School District (FASD). As such, properties in the Wheatland area

would continue to be subject to FASD school taxes. Additionally, the U.S. Postal Service is not affected by the merger so the Wheatland Post Office will remain as will the Wheatland mailing address and zip code. All other matters will fall under Hermitage, including trash collection, sewer rates, and city ordinances. A number of questions were also answered at the meeting.

A similar meeting was held for Wheatland businesses on September 14th. While that meeting covered some of the same information, it also focused on matters specifically affecting businesses. For example, Hermitage requires an annual Business License Assessment of \$200 on businesses with exemptions for smaller businesses and certain types of businesses. A filing with the Hermitage Treasurer is required each year by April 15th. Businesses were also informed that they will need to work with Berkheimer regarding the collection of employee earned income taxes and local service taxes. City officials presented information on low-interest Revolving Loan Funds available through the city for certain business expansion projects, as well as strong relationships the city has with local economic development agencies, and county, state and federal officials to help assist businesses. A brief discussion occurred regarding long-range planning to address Wheatland infrastructure needs.

Finally, the meeting also referenced the commercial building construction review and inspection process and solicited input on third party review and inspection.

Later on September 14th, a public meeting was held to present a proposed new Zoning Map to incorporate Wheatland properties into Hermitage zoning and to receive public input. The meeting was also well attended and public comments received will be used to further develop the new Zoning Map. While both communities currently have zoning ordinances in place, the Wheatland Zoning Ordinance will go away on January 1, 2024, the effective date of the merger. Therefore, Wheatland properties need to be placed within Hermitage zoning districts and a new map needs developed to reflect the same. The proposed map assigned Wheatland properties to Hermitage zoning districts that accommodated the current uses of those properties while providing for future growth. Additional public meetings will occur as the map is further developed and presented to the Hermitage Planning Commission and ultimately to the Hermitage Board of Commissioners for consideration.

The merger process continues to move forward and we believe that it will result in a stronger community with the provision of robust city services to all residents and businesses.

Small Business Advantage Grant Available to Hermitage Businesses

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection is accepting applications for its Small Business Advantage Grant program through March 22, 2024, or until funds are exhausted. The program is a first-come, first served program so it is important to apply early. It provides reimbursement grants up to \$5,000 to \$8,000, based upon the environmental impact of the project, and requires a match of 50% to 20%, based upon the same factors. Over the years, a number of Hermitage businesses have accessed this grant program.

Eligible projects must improve energy efficiency or reduce pollution or waste by upgrading or replacing equipment or supplies, improving processes, or reducing runoff into affected waterways. Additionally, eligible

projects must save the small business a minimum of \$500 per year and at least 20% of annual energy consumption or pollution-related expenses. Lighting, HVAC, boiler, and digital x-ray upgrades are the most common project types, but a wide variety of projects are eligible for funding.

In order to qualify, an entity must be a Pennsylvania-based, for-profit business with 100 or fewer full-time employees. Application guidance, required forms and information are located on the Department's website at www.dep.pa.gov. Once at the website, look for a link for the Small Business Advantage Grant under the "Popular" listing or use the search function and type in Small Business Advantage Grant Program.

such as wheelchairs, require a doctor's prescription before it can be loaned out.

Because not all types of medical equipment can be used by MERP, please call ahead at (724) 347-6377 to ensure that MERP can accept the equipment you intend to donate and to schedule a drop-off time. News and Updates from the eCenter @ Lindenpointe

The Pennsylvania Cybersecurity Center (PCC) has launched the first cohort for high school and college students. Our high school program consists of 15 students from Mercer County schools including Sharon, Hickory, Greenville, Farrell, and Union. They will begin the year learning an overview of computer concepts and computer systems, which include hardware, software, computer ethical and social standards, safety and security, networking, and telecommunications. Introductions to the Windows operating system and Linux operating system are covered. This intro class is perfect for students who have no or limited experience with computer concepts or systems to prepare them for CompTIA Network+, which will be taught in the spring. The College program consists of 14 students from local universities who will be taking the CompTIA Network+ which will focus on technical skills including networking fundamentals, implementations, operations, security, and troubleshooting. The PCC is excited to welcome these students and to foster their start in the field of cybersecurity. We hope to welcome adult learners to our



program in January 2024.

The eAcademy Class of 2024 is now in session! This year's cohort consists of 30 local area high school students from the following districts: Hermitage, Grove City, Pennsylvania Homeschoolers Accreditation Agency, Sharon, and Sharpsville. They will begin the school year learning all about the entrepreneurial mindset and its key characteristics- resiliency, resourcefulness, and always remaining solutions-oriented- even when the conditions say otherwise. Although not every student may be interested in pursuing entrepreneurship as a

career path, they will all benefit from the skills learned along the way. The eAcademy largely focuses on 21st century skills needed to be successful in the workplace regardless of a student's chosen industry, which include critical thinking, problem solving, collaboration across networks, agility, adaptability, initiative, effective communication, accessing and analyzing information, curiosity, and imagination.

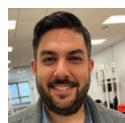
HSD Welcomes Nine New Teachers

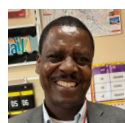
Matthew Fowler

3. What are you most excited about in starting a career in the Hermitage SD?: I am most looking forward to building meaningful connections with my students, their families, and my colleagues.



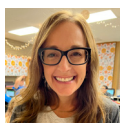

As summer vacations fade into memories, Hickory High School opened the doors and welcomed students back for a new academic year filled with a promise to create even more lasting memories. Teachers and school staff display unwavering dedication by working tirelessly to prepare classrooms, curricula, and resources to ensure a smooth start to the year.

In supporting our AAA philosophy, we started our year with an opening

theme: "We All Have Value". This theme underlines our core beliefs as a school. Hickory High School's culture is that every student, every family, every staff member has a purpose and a value within our community. This theme was discussed with the students of each grade level when communicating our goals for the year. On a daily basis, we will continue to promote our positive school culture where all students feel valued and have a purpose.

As you have read the descriptions of the Schoolwide Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (SWPBIS) in our K-7 buildings, you can see that their programs have been productive for many years. While SWPBIS programs are not as prevalent in high schools, we are proud to bring it to Hickory High School this year. It was co-designed by students and staff, to support students in a more adolescent-focused approach than what they have experienced at the younger grades. The HHS plan serves as a means to recognize students who, through action, demonstrate our

building expectations of **"Being Ready and Responsible", "Being Respectful", and "Building Positive Relationships"**. Students who demonstrate these expectations are recognized by teachers and earn items such as school spirit clothing, extra lunch choices, and other teenager-approved rewards. The program continues to implement the universal strategy of increasing positive behaviors, improving school safety, and promoting a positive school climate. It also provides several ways to further support students who may need it, from providing students additional academic help, to a daily check-in with students who are working through one of the many challenges a teenager might be facing. All in all, we know this new program will continue to build a supportive school climate and culture, and we are excited that it is up and running.

Artman has a great start to the 2023-24 school year!

At Artman, we are excited to welcome 150 new Kindergarten students to the Artman family. It is so wonderful to see the bright smiles and anticipation of our newest students coming through our doors. We also take time to talk with our 3rd grade students about being the leaders and 'example setters' in the building now that they are the oldest students.

We spend much of the first few weeks reviewing our Artman Expectations of being Ready, Respectful and Responsible as part of our School-Wide Positive Behavior Support program. We identify specific learning targets and behavioral expectations for all locations in and outside the building. Each student, K-3, participates in instructional lessons 'on location' to learn what it means to be Ready, Respectful,

and Responsible at the playground, cafeteria, restrooms, hallways, arrival/dismissal, and the bus. The lessons culminate in our Kick-Off Assembly where we celebrate our expectations and partner with our PTO for a rowdy presentation of our upcoming fundraiser.

As you will read throughout our District messages in this newsletter, all of our grades use a Schoolwide Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports system (SWBPIS). At Artman, we are in year 10 of SWPBIS and have been recognized by the Pennsylvania PBIS Network as having implemented tiers 1, 2, and 3 with fidelity. This means that we are continually developing levels of behavioral support for all students in our building. SWPBIS is under our Multi-tiered System of Supports (MTSS)



initiative which provides the framework for all of our academic and behavioral supports. This year we have created a Problem Solving Team (PST) consisting of administration, counselors, teachers, and a Behavioral Health Commission liaison to analyze our academic and behavioral data to help plan for student success. We use data to drive our decision making and it truly takes a team effort to ensure that our students have the best school experience possible!

Ionta and Delahunty Schools Celebrate Seven Years of School Wide Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (SWPBIS)

Hello Hermitage Community Members!

As always, I am excited to share with all of our Hermitage families the wonderful school happenings occurring at Ionta and Delahunty Schools. This school year marks the seven-year anniversary of our SWPBIS program in grades 4-7.

What is SWPBIS? SWPBIS is a proactive approach to teach, monitor, and support appropriate school behavior for ALL students. The focus of SWPBIS is centered on preventing behaviors of concern for each student at the school-wide, classroom, non-classroom and individual levels by acknowledging and celebrating the good choices students make.

What does a SWPBIS School look like?

- The number of positive adult-to-student interactions exceeds negative ones
- A continuum of behavior support is available for all students
- 80% of our students can state the school rules and give the appropriate behavior examples (The Three R's: Ready, Respectful, Responsible)
- Teachers, Staff Members and Administrators are active Participants

• Ongoing data collection, team planning and implementation are reviewed and discussed

The collection and analysis of behavioral data plays a significant role in helping us with developing and implementing the appropriate interventions for our students. Through the data collection process, we have developed a Positive Reinforcement Program that is centered on catching students being **Ready** for School, Being **Respectful** to their Teachers and Peers, as well as Being **Responsible** people.



Students obtain their positive recognition in the format of earning Gold and Red Tickets, a specific delineation for Ionta and Delahunty students. All adults working within the school setting have the opportunity to present our students with this form of positive recognition, where they congratulate the student for the positive behavior they witnessed, and then reward them with the ticket.



The next component that allows us to celebrate our

students' behavior is the "Principal's 200 Club". Students who earn a ticket write their name on the Principal's 200 Club board, which makes them eligible for receiving particular bigger awards throughout the school year, such as a certificate for a cafeteria snack, or a pizza party.



Over the seven-year span of implementing SWPBIS, we have seen the positive effects of the program across students' entire school day. Behaviors of concern have been reduced, and positive behaviors have increased. We continuously strive to create a school environment that fosters success with all children, and we are determined to catch our students doing good. We are truly grateful and appreciative for the implementation of this worthwhile and essential program.

A \$10 electronics tag must be purchased at the Hermitage City Building or thru TCI for each item.

Sewer Bill Payments: Options & Reminders

Automatic payments of the current month's charges can be deducted from your bank account. Sign-up forms are available online at www.hermitage.net or at the Municipal Building. Payments are deducted on the 5th of the month or the next business day after the 5th in the case of a weekend or holiday. Past due balances cannot be automatically withdrawn and will continue to accrue penalties and interest. It is the customer's responsibility to pay past due balances separately and to read each month's bill.

Checks may be mailed in the envelope provided with your bill. You **MUST** include the remit stub from your bill in order for your payment to be processed correctly. Payments without remit stubs may be delayed and late fees will accrue. These envelopes and the address printed on them are for sewer bill payments only. Payments for things other than sewer bills

should be sent to the address printed on them.

Online payment – Go to www.hermitage.net and choose the "Online Bill Pay" icon. A convenience fee of 3.5% is charged to use a credit card and a flat \$0.50 fee is charged to use a bank account/e-check.

Online bill pay through your bank. Please remember your sewer account number must be included with each payment entered. If not, payment may be delayed, and late fees will accrue. It can take up to seven days for the payment to process so please allow for this additional time.

Payments can be dropped off anytime in the drop-off box located on the north side of the parking lot at the Municipal Building. *CHECKS OR MONEY ORDERS ONLY* **CASH PAYMENTS WILL NOT BE

ACCEPTED** You must include your sewer bill remit stub or indicate the property address or sewer bill account number that you want the payment applied to. You may write that information on the memo line of your check or include it on a separate piece of paper in the envelope with your check.

When a check is returned for insufficient funds, a \$50 NSF (Non-Sufficient-Fund) fee will be charged.

We are unable to accept phone payments.

From the Desk of the Treasurer

Bernie Harry, City Treasurer

I'd like to remind everyone that the **School Real Estate** bills and the **Per Capita** bills were mailed on August 1, 2023. We are happy to inform you that the school taxes will remain at the face amount this year from October 1st through December 31, 2023. The school has decided to not charge the 10% penalty this year. All taxes remaining unpaid after December 31, 2023, will be filed for collection at the penalty amount.

Please notify the Tax Office if you have not received your bills.

Per Capita is a head tax on **every** resident **over the age of 18** and this year is **\$30.00**. **All residents are responsible for this tax and are expected to notify the tax office if they are not yet on our tax rolls.** Likewise, when moving from Hermitage, please notify the tax office to have your name removed from our tax rolls. There are exemptions (based on income from all sources) available to those who qualify. If your income is \$5,000.00 or less annually, you may be exonerated from the entire per capita bill. If your income is between \$5,000.00 and \$12,000.00, you may only be required to pay a portion of that

bill. Upon receipt of your Per Capita bill, all proof of income must be brought into our office, and a form filled out and signed by the person to be exempt.

This process must be followed each year.

Please remember that all homestead approved properties must be owner-occupied. This means that the name on the deed must match the name of the person or persons who live in that house. You can only receive the credit on one parcel. The 2023 Homestead/Farmstead allowance for all approved home-owner parcels, is \$136.48, which comes off your original School tax amount due.

Anyone who receives the homestead credit and does not qualify, is required by law to notify their tax collector of the necessary correction.

Also, if there is any change to your deed, through selling or simply a name deletion or change, the Homestead will not automatically follow. You will need to re-apply.



Forms are available on the County website as well as in our office, for your convenience beginning October 1st. All completed forms must be received at the Mercer County Courthouse by Mar. 1st.

County/City taxes will remain at the penalty amount until December 31st.

You still have time for the property tax rebate if you qualify, since once again it has been extended to December 31, 2023.
