RECYCLING DO's & DON'Ts

What to toss into your recycling bin can be confusing. It is important that residents and businesses follow the rules, policies, and guidelines established for their local programs.

People often think that because something is "plastic" that it is recyclable. This is not the case. The same holds true with the "recycling" symbol and number commonly found on plastic items. The purpose of the symbol and number is to indicate the resin type. It has nothing to do with recycling!

Instead, focus on the shape of item. When it comes to recycling, think "plastic bottles/jugs, metal cans, and clean paper." If you're holding a plastic item, consider if it is a bottle. For example, butter tubs, yogurt containers, and clam-shell/take-out food containers are plastic and usually have a recycling symbol and number on them. But—they are not a bottle/jug and belong in the trash. When in doubt, throw it out. RECYCLING SHOULD BE LOOSE, NOT BAGGED.

2024 Yard Waste Collection

Yard waste collection will take place as part of your normal curbside collection on a weekly basis starting the week of April 15th.

(Green-lid) yard waste carts or biodegradable bags may be placed at the curb on a weekly basis on your regular collection day. There is no limit to the amount of biodegradable bags a household can place at the curb.

Acceptable yard waste includes: Leaves, Grass clippings, Plants and flowers, Roots, Sawdust, Shrubbery and pruning, Branches, tree limbs under 3" in diameter, Brush up to 3' in length

Aiken will only collect bulk trash from residents who are current on their quarterly garbage bill.

*Residents with other collection days, your bulk pickup week was prior to this publication's printing.

Accepted Items

Lawn Chairs, Lamps, Bicycles, Carpet Rolls (no more than 4 feet in length), Appliances (large and small), Furniture, Tables, Washers, Dryers, Stoves, Window glass, Mattresses (any size), Freon - Air conditioners, dehumidifiers, refrigerators, and freezers must have their doors disabled and Freon removed and be properly tagged by a certified technician.

Items Not Accepted

Bagged Leaves, Computers, TVs, Fluorescent light bulbs, Construction material

This collection is for bulk items only, so extra regular garbage put in bags, boxes or other trash receptacles will not be accepted

I enjoy being on the school board to be able to support our staff, teachers, and students, with our number one priority being safety.



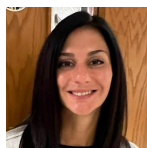
Gianna Brown

I look forward to getting to know the students and doing my part to help them reach their fullest potential.



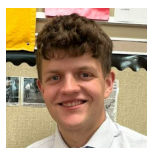
Jennifer Cardon

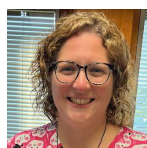
Mara Weekley

Artman Elementary Back to School 2024

Artman is back at it again in 2024 and we are as excited as ever. This year we welcome 145 new kindergarten students to the school community. Now that we are a few weeks in, our new students are quickly becoming part of our wonderful Artman family.



The first few weeks of school serve as a time to review our expectations of being Ready, Respectful, and Responsible. During these weeks, the students have

Continued Focus on Growth

As educators we are constantly reviewing our data and refining our approach to better meet the needs of our students. An area of change for this current year is a change to using Acadience Learning for our math and reading global benchmarking assessments. Acadience is not new to us as we have used it in various grade levels for several years. This year we look to streamline our assessment process in order to increase efficiency and obtain data sources that are uniform across the grade levels. The teachers will participate in professional development sessions aimed at data analysis to identify strengths and areas of growth ranging from whole building level down to the individual student.

Last year we added the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness program to our reading curriculum K-2. We saw amazing growth among our students through the use of this program. In the spring, we coordinated with the Midwestern Intermediate Unit (MIU4) and the Primary Health Network Charitable Foundation to provide Heggerty materials and training to many of the pre-k providers in the Shenango Valley. As a result of this collaboration, elementary schools throughout the valley will receive incoming kindergarten students with a deeper grasp of early literacy with a focus on phonemic awareness.

This year we are introducing the Enhanced Core Reading Instruction (ECRI) program in kindergarten. This program will help to enrich our phonics instruction, which when combined with Heggerty's phonemic awareness will create a stronger foundation in literacy for our students. The plan is to roll out ECRI over the course of three years, each year moving up a grade level until we reach second grade. We have partnered with the PA Training and Technical Assistance Network (PATTAN) and the MIU4 to help with our training and professional development with ECRI through this multi-year endeavor.

"Back to School Bash" 2024

This officially begins our PBIS Principal's 200 program with the goal of our students being 'caught in the act' of doing great things where they too can be awarded a ticket.

The impact of the Back to School Bash goes beyond just providing backpacks and school supplies. Parents and caregivers had the opportunity to connect with professionals from various social and human services. These included resources for transportation, health, vision, dental care, mental and behavioral health support, child care, before and after school programs, hygiene and grooming services, and literacy resources.

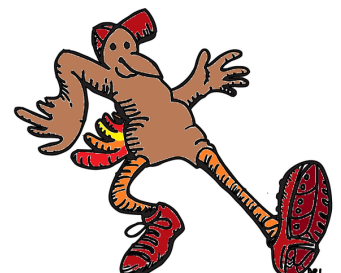

Water Quality Corner

Invasive species are a growing threat to our local waterways, disrupting ecosystems, and harming native plants and animals. These non-native species can spread rapidly, outcompeting local wildlife and altering the balance of our aquatic environments. Invasive species like zebra mussels, water chestnuts, and Asian carp can clog water systems, degrade water quality, and cause economic damage by impacting recreational activities and commercial fishing.

To protect our waterways, it's crucial to prevent the introduction and spread of these invaders. Residents can help by cleaning boats, fishing gear, and watercraft thoroughly before moving them between water bodies. Additionally, avoid releasing plants, fish, or animals into the wild. By staying vigilant and practicing responsible water use, we can all play a part in preserving the health of our local waterways for future generations.

White House Cyber Director Visits eCenter



On September 17th, White House Cyber Director, Harry Coker, Jr., and his team, visited the Pennsylvania Cybersecurity Center (PCC) headquarters at the eCenter@LindenPointe in Hermitage. Director Coker, a career Naval Officer and former senior executive with the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the National Security Agency (NSA), is tasked with advising the President of the United States on cybersecurity policy and strategy. Cybersecurity involves the protection of technology devices, including computers and smartphones, networks and data from digital threats. These threats include actions by foreign adversaries, including China, Russia, Iran and North Korea, as well as terrorist organizations and international crime syndicates, to compromise our national infrastructure, steal assets, and interrupt commerce. Cybersecurity is critical to our national security.

The PCC has trained over 120 area high school and college students, and adult learners, in cybersecurity and has helped them gain valuable industry certifications

to work in the field. A \$1.15 federal grant will help the PCC train even more individuals and expand to reach students at 69 school districts in the region. Director Coker celebrated the PCC as a grassroots effort to train cybersecurity workers needed to fill 12,000 open cybersecurity jobs in Pennsylvania, and as a model to replicate nationwide. He recognized local resident Rick Bruckner, a former dispatcher at the Mercer County 911 center, who wanted to do more to help people who are victims of cyber attacks and scams. He called Bruckner, and other students, "patriots" who want to help others and protect their country.

During the visit, Mercyhurst University announced a collaboration with PCC to provide high school students on the autism spectrum an opportunity to receive both high school and college credits (dual enrollment) for cybersecurity coursework through the university. The program draws from Mercyhurst's Brad McGarry Center for Neurodiversity and its Cybersecurity Program. According to Mercyhurst, the program will address a critical workforce need while also creating opportunities for students on the autism spectrum to excel in a field where their unique skills and attributes are incredibly valuable.

Director Coker and his team spent several hours at the PCC engaging in a Student Listening Session and conducting an Ecosystem Roundtable that included local

educators and workforce development professionals. Additionally, the day included public remarks from Director Coker, Bradley Calleja, Executive Director of the eCenter, and Craig Columbus, chairman of the LindenPointe Development Corporation, as well as a panel discussion involving Dr. Christopher Mansour, chair of the Computing and Information Science Department at Mercyhurst University, Dr. Kathy Richardson, president of Westminster College, Rear Admiral Hank Bond (U.S. Navy, Ret.) co-founder of the cybersecurity firm ForceNow, and Jeff Meier, former eCenter Executive Director.



From the Desk of the Treasurer



Hello Everyone,

Each homeowner in Hermitage including the Wheatland neighborhood should have received your school real estate bill, and every resident should have received their per capita bill. This includes residents both home-owners as well as renters over

the age of 18. If you have not received yours, please notify us.

The per capita bill although showing amounts for the city and for the school, is only one combined bill of \$30.00, and therefore **requires only one check** for the full amount due.

Those owning multiple parcels may combine all Hermitage school payments to one check payable to Hermitage Treasurer, Wheatland school payments to another check made payable to the Farrell School District.

Multiple Per capita bills may also be combined on one check and all the county/city payments to another check each made payable to Hermitage Treasurer. **We are unable to accept**

payment for different types of taxes combined on one check.

If you qualify and have not yet applied for the 2023 tax year rebate, contact your tax preparer before December 31, 2024 to do so.

Also, if your property is owner-occupied and your prime residence, make sure you are homestead approved. If unsure, call our office and we will be happy to assist you.

All taxes will be collected through December 31st after which time they will be filed delinquent.

We are available in our office Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, so as always, feel free to contact us in person, by phone at 724-347-4472, or by e-mailing bharry@hermitage.net.

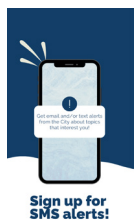
