Come prepared to run your PR in the mile! The start will be on Kerrwood Drive near Kraynaks, proceed down East State Street hill towards the Shenango Valley Mall, finishing on Rt. 18 just beyond Hickory Global Methodist Church.

We strongly encourage participants to dress in costume, but please **DO NOT** add glass or fragile ornaments to your costume. They will fall and break on the run, causing a hazard on the roadway. We will ask you to remove them at registration.

Awards will be given to the top 3 Open Male and Female finishers, the top Male/Female masters and for the top finishers in the following age categories:

Men and Women 10 and under/11-14/15-19/20-29/30-39/40-49/50-59/60-69/70 and up. Awards will be presented at the conclusion of the race

in the Hickory GMC Parking Lot. There will also be awards for the top three costumes!

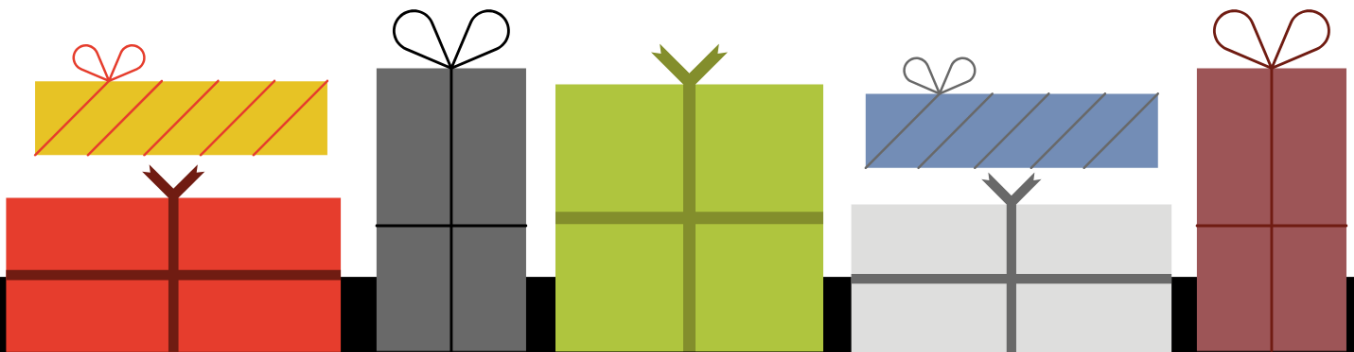

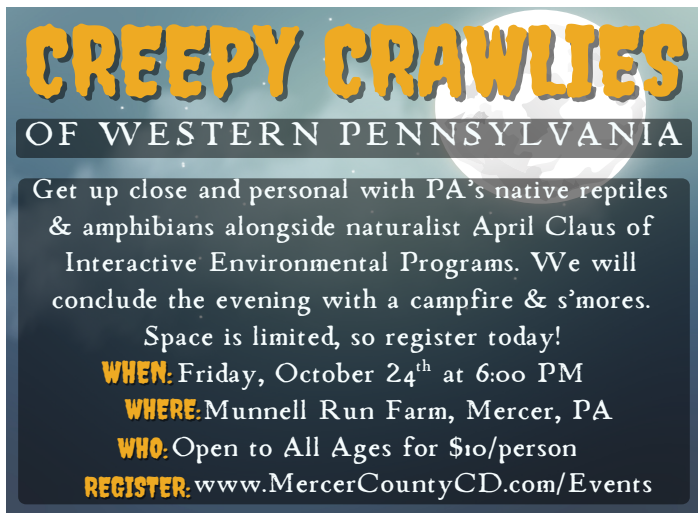

Twisted Yoga and Barre Studio

In her early 20s, Jackie Stewart did not like yoga. The owner of Twisted Yoga and Barre Studio had been athletic all her life, taught aerobics all through college, and also had started teaching kick boxing and cycling.

Yoga was "too calm," she said.

But, in her late 20s, Stewart started looking for a way to unwind. She signed up for a hot power yoga class.

"Oh my word. I was like, 'Wow, that was really challenging,'" Stewart said. "It was probably the hardest class I ever took. I really started to like it."

She enrolled in a 200-hour yoga certification course at Amazing Yoga in Pittsburgh.

"I really got into it," Stewart said. "It was the only thing I wanted to do."

Yoga, she said, "has so many layers to it. You can't come to your first yoga class and be like, 'I've learned everything there is.' I've been doing it for 20 years and every single day I feel like I learn something new, whether it be from another instructor or a client."

She later completed a 500-hour yoga training class at Practice Yoga in Naples, Fla.

After having worked numerous jobs, Stewart decided to work for herself and opened Twisted in 2013. In 2022, Twisted moved to its current location, 3565 E. State St., in the Cornerstone Plaza.

Over that time, Stewart has expanded into barre and cycling classes, and developed a loyal clientele.

"I would say 60 percent of my clientele started with me 12 years ago," she said.

The heated power yoga class is the studio's "bread and butter," Stewart said, but she also offers gentle, slow-flow yoga and adds specialty classes from time to time.

The barre class has "a tad of ballet movement in it," but also incorporates light weights, physical therapy movements and squats, some of it off the barre.

"It's a no-impact, high-intensity environment," Stewart said. "It's not quiet and zen like yoga. The music's going – you're moving."

The stationary bikes are "fused" with other classes. Referring to the Pedal and Power class, she said, "Half the class is done on the bike, half the class is yoga that counterbalances all the hunching and tightness you would use on a bike. We've also combined that (bicycling) with barre classes as well."

Classes are offered in the morning and in the evening, and Stewart teaches most of them herself. All ages and abilities are welcome. She said a woman with multiple sclerosis participates in one of her classes.

"She can't do everything in a power class or a barre class, but she says coming here is better than physical therapy because that's her time out, that's her time away," Stewart said. "Even though she can't do everything, that's her improvement. She does what she can. She's been coming for over 10 years, now."

Yoga, barre and cycling are not exclusively female activities as men and boys, including high school and college athletes, come to her classes, Stewart said. Yoga helps athletes with

the mental aspects of the game, as well as the physical, she said.

Although Stewart said she wasn't sure the studio would last a year when she first started, she now offers 20 classes a week and is open seven days a week. Her promotion has largely been from clients telling others about what she offers.

"It's a lot of work, but I do enjoy it," Stewart said.

The city is pleased to welcome the Hermitage Performing Arts Academy (HPA) to its small business community. Located at 2925 E. State Street (Hot Rod's Subs Plaza) the HPA began classes on September 8th and offers morning, evening, and weekend classes in dance, theater and performance for children of all ages, as well as dance classes for adults. Offerings include ballet, tap, jazz, hip hop, lyrical, tumble, baton, contemporary dance, acting, and singing.

Owner, Teri Nobbs has over 45 years of experience in dancing and teaching dance as a career and draws on a diverse staff of trained instructors. Teri has successfully operated the Columbiana (Ohio) Performing Arts Center for many years and has now expanded to Hermitage. Small Business Advantage Grants Available

The PA Department of Environmental Protection's Small Business Advantage Grant program is now accepting applications from eligible small businesses for pollution prevention, energy efficiency and natural resource conservation projects. Projects must save the business at least \$500 annually in energy or pollution costs and reduce annual energy or pollution related expenses by at least 20%. Certain project types are eligible with Lighting, HVAC, boiler and Digital Medical X-Rays and Scanners being the most common.

This is a first-come, first-served program that is available until the funding runs out or through March 13, 2026, whichever comes first. Funding ranges from 50% or \$7,500 (whichever is less) up to 80% or \$12,000 (whichever is less) based on environmental impact and project location. It is a reimbursement grant with funding provided after the approved project is completed. Pennsylvania registered for-profit businesses with 100 or fewer full-time equivalents are eligible; sole proprietorships are ineligible. Council Ring Project Taking Shape

The City of Hermitage is collaborating with the United Way of Mercer County to construct a Council Ring at Stull Nature Reserve. A Council Ring is a circular, stone, seated area with an opening leading to the middle, which can also feature a fire pit in the center. The design was popularized by Danish-American landscape architect, Jens Jensen, and it is conducive to group discussion and learning.

The United of Mercer County secured a \$25,000 grant from the National Fuel Gas Foundation to help fund the project. The city will deliver the project, which is currently in design. Once completed, the Council Ring will be available to the public and may be used by area schools, scouting organizations, and community groups. Its location at Stull will encourage in-nature, hands-on environmental learning opportunities.

Dr. Andrew Kemper, Principal, grade K-3

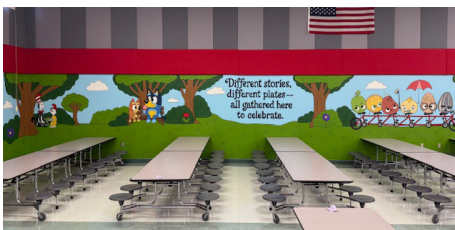

Ionta and Delahunty School Counseling in 2025

Mr. Eric Trosch, Principal, grades 4-7

Twenty years ago, school counselors were commonly referred to as guidance counselors. Their primary responsibilities focused on scheduling classes, assisting with college applications, and career planning—especially at the high school level. In elementary and middle schools, the role was more limited, often involving test coordination or occasional student support.

At that time, mental health was only minimally addressed. It carried a stigma and was often pushed into the background.

Today, in 2025, a significant and positive paradigm shift has taken place. The role of the school counselor has broadened into a vital part of each school community. We are excited to highlight the multifaceted and essential work of the School Counseling Department at Ionta and Delahunty Schools. In speaking with Mrs. Mary Mild, our grades 4-7

School Counselor, and guidance secretary, Mrs. Suzanne Hart, both shared valuable expertise and insight into the evolution of school counseling and the inner workings of our department.

Mrs. Mild emphasized how the role has expanded. Counselors are now recognized as integral school leaders who support academic achievement, social-emotional learning, and career development.

Mental health support is now a major priority. Counselors help students manage stress, anxiety, bullying, conflict resolution, and resilience. In addition to administrative tasks, school counselors deliver classroom lessons, facilitate small group sessions, and provide one-on-one support.

As a former guidance counselor, I have witnessed firsthand the significant changes in



collaboration. Today, Mrs. Mild and Mrs. Hart, each in their respective roles, work extensively with teachers, families, and community mental health providers in ways that were far less common fifteen or twenty years ago. Supporting students with a wide range of mental health needs has become a routine, essential part of their daily work.

Key Aspects of the School Counselor's Role

Student Supports

- Meeting with students for academic, social-emotional, and career needs.
- Advocating for students in challenging situations and helping them identify solutions.
- Collaborating with the School Social Worker to identify students for counseling or skills-based groups.
- Focusing on prevention and early intervention to stop small issues from becoming larger problems.
- Partnering with families to connect students with school-based therapy, the SCORE program, behavioral health therapists, and community agencies.
- Full-time school social worker through contract with Community Counseling Center.

Special Programming

- Hornet Hive Clothing Closet – provides clothing, shoes, toiletries, and backpacks for students in need.
- Problem-Solving Team Meetings – monthly meetings with staff representatives to determine interventions and supports for students facing academic, social-emotional, or behavioral concerns.
- CharacterStrong Student of the Month Recognition.
- Positive Peer Relationships Program – supports healthy peer interactions.
- Check-In/Check-Out Program – daily monitoring to ensure students are prepared for school and transitions home.

- Schoolwide PBIS – includes Gold and Red Ticket recognition, VIP Lunch Table, and Golden Spatula Cafeteria Behavior Awards.

State Requirements

- PSSA testing administration and coordination.
- Career evidence documentation (two pieces per student annually, aligned with PA Career Standards).
- Student Assistance Program in partnership with Mercer County Behavioral Health Commission.
- Mandated reporting.

Academic Support

- Delivering Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) classes.
- Identifying and applying research-based interventions.
- Referring students for academic tutoring.
- Holding quarterly meetings with struggling students.
- Communicating regularly with parents.

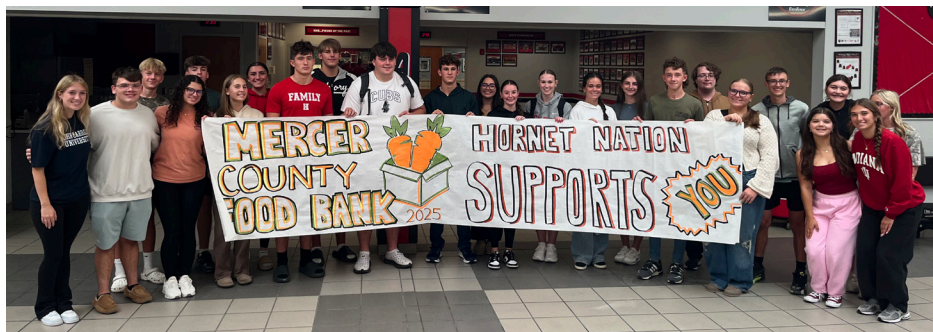

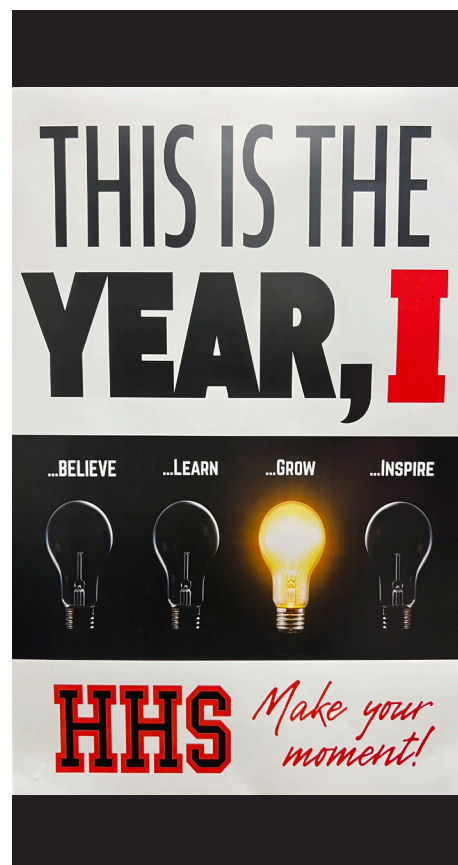

Hello everyone. **School Real Estate bills and Per Capita bills** were mailed on August 1st and we are happy to inform you that there is NO increase for tax year 2025! There was an increase in the Homestead/Farmstead allowance. The amount for approved parcels is \$193.20 for 2025. **Hermitage School District taxes only will remain at the face**

amount this year from October 1st through December 31, 2025, since the Hermitage School District has decided to not charge the 10% penalty again this year. All taxes remaining unpaid after December 31, 2025, will be filed for collection at the penalty amount.

Wheatland neighborhood residents pay Farrell School tax and their bills will be at the face amount until November 30th and then will go to the penalty amount until December 31st, at which time they will be filed for collection.

Please notify the Tax Office if you have not received your bills.

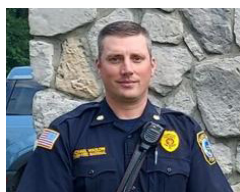
Per Capita is a head tax on every resident **over the age of 18** and this year is **\$30.00**. **All residents are responsible for this tax and are expected to notify the tax office if they are not yet on our tax rolls. This includes the Wheatland neighborhood of Hermitage. Any exemptions must be addressed in our office annually.** When moving from Hermitage, please notify the tax office to have your name removed.

All Homestead/Farmstead approved properties must be owner-occupied. This means that the name on the deed must match the name of the person or persons who live in that house. This only applies to your main residence. Anyone who receives the Homestead credit and does not qualify, is required by law to notify their tax collector of the necessary correction.

The Importance of Carbon Monoxide Alarms in the Home

Carbon monoxide (CO) is often called the "silent killer", and for good reason. When inhaled, this colorless, odorless, and tasteless gas replaces oxygen in the bloodstream, preventing vital organs from receiving the oxygen they need. Symptoms of CO poisoning can include headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion, and fatigue. In severe cases, exposure can lead to loss of consciousness, permanent brain damage, or death. Because we cannot sense carbon monoxide, alarms are the only reliable way to detect dangerous levels in the home. These devices monitor the air and sound an alert when CO concentrations rise, giving residents time to evacuate and address the source of the problem. To protect yourself and your home, it's important to be aware of common sources of CO in the home, install and maintain a CO alarm, and follow prevention and safety measures. Here is what you need to know:

Carbon monoxide can come from a variety of everyday household sources, including:

- Gas stoves and ovens
- Furnaces and boilers
- Fireplaces and wood stoves
- Water heaters
- Generators
- Vehicles left running in attached garages

Experts recommend:

- Installing CO alarms on every level of the home, especially near sleeping areas.
- Testing alarms monthly to ensure they are working.
- Replacing batteries regularly (or choosing models with sealed, long-life batteries).
- Replacing the alarm itself every 5–10 years, depending on the manufacturer's guidelines.

While alarms are crucial, prevention is equally important. Regular maintenance of fuel-burning appliances, proper ventilation, and safe practices, such as never using grills or generators indoors, all reduce the risk of CO buildup. By installing and maintaining alarms, as well as practicing safe habits with fuel-burning appliances, families can protect themselves from the dangers of carbon monoxide and create a safer home environment. If you need assistance installing or servicing a carbon monoxide or smoke alarm in your home, please contact the Fire Marshal's Office.

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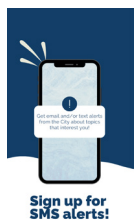
