Animal Shelter Closes In On Goal for New Building

The construction of a new Animal Shelter on Lynnwood Drive in Hermitage is underway and fundraising to complete the project is building momentum. Rien Construction was awarded the low bid for the construction of a pre-engineered 6,000 square foot building that will more than double the capacity for dogs and cats and provide a clean and safe place that will advance the shelter's mission of promoting adoption. The current building on Broadway Road was built in 1966, is well overcapacity, and lacks proper ventilation and space for treating and exercising animals. The new location is adjacent to Tails of Hope Spay and Neuter Clinic, which will facilitate

further partnerships through these animal care organizations.

Shenango Valley Animal Shelter, Inc. (SVAS), is a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation with 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status, that is a collaboration between the communities of Farrell, Hermitage, Sharon, Sharpsville, Shenango Township, and West Middlesex. The municipalities provide operational support for animal control, while the SVAS accepts donations for the construction project. A series of state grants, bequests, private foundation grants, and donations, totaling nearly \$1 million, have provided funds to prepare the site and erect the building. The SVAS Board set a

goal to raise an additional \$750,000 to address the interior of the building, including HVAC, electrical, plumbing and constructing the various rooms. Almost 60% of those additional funds have been raised to date, and contributions are being accepted to reach the goal and complete the project this year.

County Property Reassessment Update - Look for Value Mailers

Hermitage property owners will receive Value Mailers, starting in January, as part of the county-wide property reassessment process authorized by the Mercer County Commissioners. The Value Mailer will contain a dollar figure that should reflect what your property would sell for on the open market in today's dollars. If you agree with the figure contained in the Value Mailer there is no action that you need to take. If you believe that the value is too high and that your property would not fetch that price in an arms-length transaction, then you should pursue an Informal Appeal.

The Value Mailer will explain the Informal Appeal which is an in-person meeting or telephone discussion

with Tyler Technologies, the contractor handling the reassessment process for the county. It is an opportunity for you to provide evidence, discuss the assessed value and ask questions. If you are not satisfied after the Informal Appeal, you will have an opportunity to request a Formal Appeal before the Mercer County Board of Appeals, later in 2026. The Board of Appeals decision is appealable through the courts. The reassessment process is scheduled to wrap up before property tax bills go out in 2027.

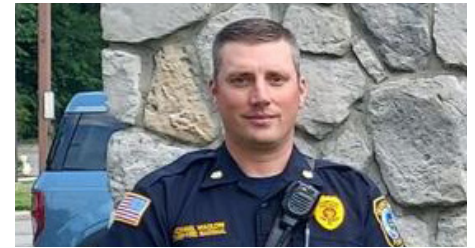
The installation of a Safe Haven Baby Box reflects the Hermitage Fire Department's continued commitment to public safety and community well-being. Once installed, the box

Horse Rescue in Transfer

On January 8, 2026, the Hermitage Volunteer Fire Department responded to an unusual rescue request from Transfer Volunteer Fire Department involving an adult male horse that had become trapped in a stable doorway at a local farm. The horse was found on its left side, pinned between the stable door and an adjacent wall, and unable to stand under its own power. It was estimated that the animal had been down for nearly four hours prior to HFD arrival.

After assessing the situation and making the horse as comfortable as possible, crews quickly realized this would require some creative problem-solving. A large-animal veterinarian arrived on scene and advised that returning the horse to its feet was critical to its survival. HFD crews then demonstrated exceptional ingenuity by adapting specialized rescue equipment, typically used for human and vehicle rescue, for a large-animal application. Access was gained to the hay mow above the stall, where crews carefully cut an opening in the floor directly over the animal. Using heavy-duty lifting straps, cable winches, and a rope haul system to create mechanical advantage, the horse was slowly and safely lifted under the veterinarian's supervision. Rescue airbags were placed beneath the



animal during the lift to help support its weight and reduce pressure. After several hours of teamwork, the horse was back on all fours and soon grazing in its pasture. We're grateful for the positive outcome and proud to have been able to lend a hand (and a few rescue tools) to help our neighbors to the north.

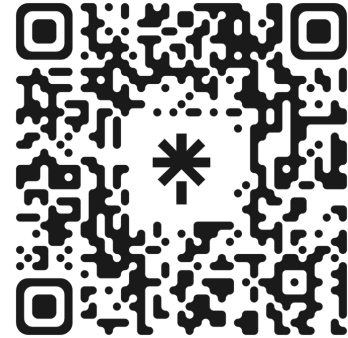

A New Look at Title I Services and Intervention Programming at Ionta Elementary School

Eric Trosch, Principal, Grades 4-7

Ionta Elementary School is pleased to welcome Mrs. Jaci Barker as our new Title I School Coordinator and Intervention Specialist. While Mrs. Barker is new to the Math and ELA teams at Ionta, she brings extensive experience within the Hermitage School District and beyond.

Mrs. Barker joined the district in

2014 as a third-grade teacher at Artman Elementary School, after teaching at Shenango Elementary School from 2007-2014. During that time, she earned her Master of Education Degree as a Reading Specialist from Edinboro University.

Under the mentorship and guidance of the Title I Teacher/

Instructional Coach for Artman, Mrs. Beth Stefano, Mrs. Barker and the grade 4 and 5 teams have developed a Title I program that models the very successful structure of Artman's Title I program. The program takes a two-fold approach, which is both teacher-oriented and student-centered. Mrs. Barker supports

classroom teachers by providing practical instructional resources while also implementing research-based interventions to improve student achievement in reading and mathematics.

Title I services are determined through a comprehensive review of data, including global assessments in Math and ELA, classroom performance, benchmark and state assessments, teacher recommendations, and progress monitoring results. Eligibility is based on academic need, and services are supplemental to core classroom instruction.

This year, Mrs. Barker has led the implementation of a new initiative known as WIN (What I Need) Time. During WIN Time, students receive targeted reading and math support through small-group or individualized instruction

focused on specific skill needs. Interventions emphasize comprehension, fluency, problem-solving, conceptual understanding, and the use of instructional strategies and visual models.

Title I services are delivered through a variety of models, including pull-out and push-in support, as well as designated intervention blocks, all designed to minimize disruption to core instruction. An essential component of this work is the dedication of our trained paraprofessionals, whose commitment greatly contributes to student success.

Student progress is monitored regularly through formative assessments and data reviews. Data team meetings are held quarterly to evaluate progress and adjust interventions as needed to



ensure meaningful growth.

Kindergarten Screening Process:

Our Kindergarten registration process included an academic screening for kindergarten readiness, a speech/language screening, and a vision screening. Water Pollution Control Department Update



We are pleased to report that the S. Neshannock, Miller, and Virginia Roads sewer extension project is nearing completion. Mortimer Construction will finish with landscaping and general punch list items in the spring. The project will connect 93 homes to the sewer system

replacing on-lot systems that had a high failure rate. State grants helped offset the project cost. Most recently, letters were mailed to homeowners outlining the next steps for connecting to the system.

The Water Pollution Control Department prides

itself on providing essential and reliable services at a reasonable cost. Over the years, our food waste to energy program has generated revenues helping to contain costs. As a result, sewer rates have been frozen for the past 12 years. However, the system includes over 150 miles of collection and sewer interceptors and 17 pump stations. These facilities and equipment require regular maintenance and replacement, as they age, and the effects of inflation require additional revenues to address the same. In response, the Board of Commissioners approved a phased-in sewer fee increase to maintain the integrity of the system and to continue to provide reliable service to our customers.

Please know that the department is dedicated to providing a high level of services to the homeowners, renters and businesses that we serve. We wish all a safe and prosperous New Year!

Hello Everyone. I hope you had a nice Holiday season and are now enjoying the daytime hours increasing as each day goes by. January has greeted us with quite a bit of snow, but hopefully it will warm up soon.

This is the time of year to take a break from property taxes. All unpaid taxes have been turned over to the County and the unpaid Per Capita bills have gone to Sharp Collections. **Keep in mind that we only collect for current year taxes and they must be paid in our office by December 31th of each year, in order to keep from being filed for collection. All those with 2025 unpaid taxes will hear from either the county for real estate or sharp for per capita sometime in February.**

This is a good time of year to have your receipts handy to prepare your tax rebate if eligible. Receipts are available in our office or by e-mail if needed. Forms will be available in our office if you don't receive one by mail, and they should be filed with your income taxes.

Have you ever applied for the Homestead on your residence? Generally, it's a one-time application unless you have a change on your deed. **Keep in mind that by law, you can only claim Homestead on the house in which you reside and is deeded in your name. You cannot claim the Homestead on more than one property!**

The county has announced no increase on their portion of the county/city bill, while the city portion will be set at 7 mills. These bills will be mailed to you on **March 1st.**

This bill labeled County/City is one bill and does not require one check for the county portion and another check for the city portion. Please remit one check for the combined amount stated on your bill.

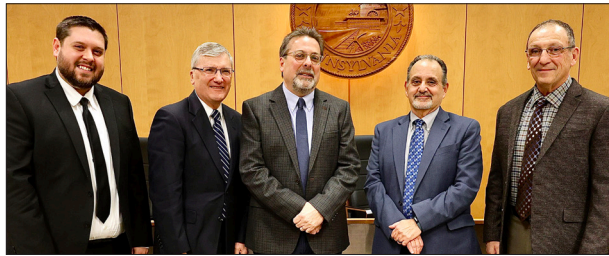
