Multiple Infrastructure Projects Underway



The City has multiple capital infrastructure improvement projects underway with construction on other projects ready to begin. The total cost for all the projects is approximately \$2.1M. The first phase (Rettig Dr., Rockwell Dr., Bartholomew Dr., and parts of Lillian Dr., Woodlawn Dr., Fairfield Dr. and Cohasset Dr.) of Block 5 of the Neighborhood Investment Program has begun with replacement and installation of storm water drainage facilities.

Milling, base repair, and paving of streets will begin very soon, followed by the installation of new street and regulatory signs and construction of a pedestrian connection into Buhl Park from the intersection at Rettig Dr. and Lillian Dr. A major storm water improvement project is being completed along parts of Festor Dr., and the milling and paving work on Clearview Dr., Candy Ln. and Festor Dr. has begun. Later this summer, the rear parking lot at the Municipal Building will be milled and repaved, and a new parking lot, tot playground, trail extension, and field lights will be constructed at the Athletic Complex on South Darby Rd. Also this summer, Phase II of Block 4 (northern Patagonia area) of the Neighborhood Investment Program will mill and repave Cambria St. and Kossuth St. and install new signage.

Some of these projects will cause limited traffic delays and lane closures throughout the project area. The City and its contractors will take the necessary steps to ensure the least amount of inconvenience possible to residents, property owners and the traveling public. All projects should be completed by late fall.

Field Maintenance Seminar Held at Hermitage Athletic Complex

On May 20th, the City hosted a Field Maintenance Seminar at the Hermitage Athletic Complex located on South Darby Road. The field day covered several hands-on practices used by professionals in the sports turf industry. Many of the hands-on practices included: basic batter box and pitching mound repair, general infield maintenance including proper dragging, edging and hand raking techniques, the uses and advantages of using Calcined Clay products, and proper use of fertilizers.



Many professionals from the Tri-State area were on hand including representatives from the Mahoning Valley Scrappers, Youngstown State University, Grove City College, former Pittsburgh Pirates field managers, and Kent State University. The Field Day was very informative, and the City received many compliments on the Complex from all who attended.

Solid Waste ~ Rates Reduced, Services Increased

New Solid Waste Contract Takes Effect August 1

On May 28 the Hermitage Board of Commissioners awarded a new five year contract to Tri-County Industries, the City's current provider of residential solid waste collection services. The new rate for unlimited recycling and yard waste collection plus a 95 gallon garbage cart will be \$50.40 per quarter, or a decrease of 11.5 percent for 80 percent of City customers. Customers utilizing the 35 gallon garbage carts will also see decreased costs. Tags to apply to bags for customers who only utilize a couple of bags per month have been reduced in cost from \$3.00 to 95 cents per tag. Included in the new contract is a second bulk trash pickup day per year. In addition to residents being able to bring tires and appliances to the City Garage on Virginia Road for disposal, effective August 1st

with the new contract, Hermitage residents will be able to bring electronic waste to the Garage for recycling.

Over the length of the current contract, Hermitage residents increased recycling collections by 150 percent and yard waste collections by 560 percent. At the same time, the amount of garbage collected for deposit in landfills has been reduced by 1.4 million pounds per year. "The City encourages all residents to continue to support recycling and yard waste composting to reduce the amount of waste that is deposited in landfills," said City Manager Gary Hinkson.

E-Waste Recycling Program

Effective August 1, 2014, Hermitage residents can recycle e-waste by dropping the items off at the **City Garage on Virginia Road** on **Tuesdays and Fridays** between **7:00 a.m. and noon**.

E-waste means all types of electronics, including:

- televisions
- computers (including monitors, keyboards, mice, and printers),
- cell phones
- any other electronic device that is banned in landfills per the Pennsylvania Covered Device Act, effective January, 2013.

From the Desk of the Treasurer



August 1st is the mail date for both your School Real Estate and Per Capita bills. It is your responsibility to notify the City in the event you do not receive them.

Per Capita is a head tax waged on every resident over the age of 18 and this year remains at \$35.00. There are exemptions, (based on income from all sources) available to those who qualify. Upon receipt of your Per Capita bill, all proof of income must be brought into our office and a form filled out and signed by the person to be exempt. This process must be followed each year.

Real Estate taxes remain at 60.239 mills. Also, the Homestead/Farmstead approved amount for this year is 99.03 per parcel.

This amount will show up as a credit on your School tax bill. The Homestead/Farmstead Act also enables taxpayers to satisfy their school taxes in payments.

This year it will be offered once again to all property owners in Hermitage. It is payable in 3 installments set by the School district.

The schedule is as follows. Bills mailed August 1

1st installment – on or before September 2nd

2nd installment – on or before October 31st

3rd installment – on or before December 15th

Certain rules apply to these payments and they are explained on the tax bill. Please remember that all homestead approved properties must be owner-occupied. This means that the name on the deed must match the name of the person or persons who live in that house. Anyone who receives the homestead credit and does not meet the requirements is required to notify their tax collector of the necessary correction.

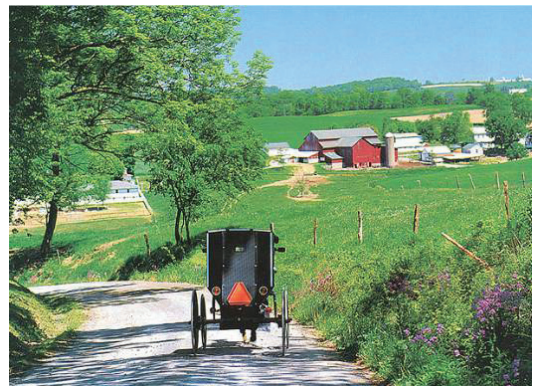

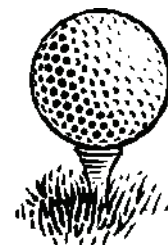

95¢ Bag/Large Item Tag

One per 32-gallon trash bag or any other item up to 25 lbs. such as lawn chairs, lamps, bicycles, carpet rolls, small appliances.

\$4 Bulky Item Tag

One for each item such as upholstered furniture, tables, dressers, headboards, armoires, mattresses, etc. Call ahead for pickup.

\$8 Major Appliance Tag

One for each item: washer, dryer, dishwasher, stove, water heater, trash compactor. Air conditioners, refrigerators & freezers must have their doors disabled and refrigerant removed by a technician first. Call one full business day ahead for pickup.

✗ Unacceptable Wastes - items unsuitable for residential collection

Hazardous, infectious, or toxic household wastes including flammable liquids, explosives, fireworks, oxygen tanks, ammunition, liquid paints, varnishes, photo chemicals, insecticides, weed killers, pool chemicals, propane tanks, solvents, auto fluids and lead-acid batteries, electronics (TV's computers, etc.) are not acceptable for residential waste collection. Call 724-981-0800 if you have any questions.



Very large and heavy items such as furnaces, construction & demolition debris, paving materials, stones, rocks, auto parts, bathtubs, spas, pianos, tree trunks and stumps fall outside the scope of residential waste collection. Please contact Tri-County Industries or another commercial hauler for details.

Cart Placement— Place your carts at the curb the night before collection day. Place carts 2 feet apart at the curb line. Keep at least 5 feet away from mailboxes. Point the lid arrows on the cart toward the street. Retrieve your carts by the end of your collection day.

Holiday Pickup Schedule— No collection is made on the following holidays: New Years Day, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas. If your regular collection falls on or after the weekday of the holiday, your collection will occur one day later than normal. No schedule change if the holiday falls on a weekend.

Winter Preparation and Delays— When snow or ice prevents collection on your scheduled day, leave your cart at the curb to be collected the next day. Clear the snow around your carts.
