Hermitage companies operated by the Perry family work to cleanup the environment

Don Perry's lifelong passion of being a steward of the land and working with environmental agencies dates back to Perry Brothers coal and limestone company in Jefferson Township. His passion mixed with administrative and business leadership operating restaurants, hotels, housing developments, and Oak Tree Country Club and led in 1993 to Don's creating BioRemedial Technologies, a biological remediation subcontractor in Hermitage.

Don's goal, while hiring Ph.D. researchers, was to generate a biological remediation solution that focused on the natural occurring bacteria found within the soil or groundwater to degrade a contaminating of concern within a specific site.

Don is president and chief executive officer of BioRemedial. Sons Matt and Tyler share his concern for the land and joined their father's

business when they completed college, Matt in 2001 and Tyler in 2005. Matt earned a BA in Economics from Grove City College with a focus on environmental studies. Tyler earned a BA in Economics from The University of Pittsburgh and a Masters in Business Administration with a focus on management from Youngstown State University.

In 2008, Matt and Tyler became partners in Compliance Environmental Services (CES), a full service consulting business that focuses on all aspects of environmental concerns.

Services from environmental site assessments, complex treatment of toxic chemicals, gasoline, water, and acid mine drainage to comparatively basic remediation of mold and asbestos take the sister companies of BioRemedial Technologies and CES throughout the Shenango Valley, the U.S., and around the world.

For Hermitage residents, the Perry's feel site investigation is a very important service they provide. Site assessment is known as a Phase I report by state and national environmental regulatory agencies. It is prepared for a real estate holding that identifies potential or existing ecological contamination liabilities.

"We can't stress enough the importance of an environmental site assessment when buying a property," says Don. "We inspect the property, do a historical search, and look for any red flags for the potential buyer."

The companies have nine employees

including PhD. microbiologists, professional geologists, and experienced field technicians to handle any situation. Experience and expertise enable the Perry's to adapt their technology to meet the needs of the site in a cost effective manner.

The company's sites have been given "No Further Action" declarations from regulatory agencies that result in no deed restrictions and attainment of drinking water standards.

Business and government contacts led Don and Tyler to South Africa in 2010 for two weeks of work on a railroad project. The bulk of work is in Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, New York, and New Jersey.



Hermitage 2030 – Zoning Update

The zoning ordinance is the most widely used tool to implement the comprehensive plan. As such, the City began the process of updating its zoning ordinance, which was adopted in 1993 and amended many times over the years since. The update will allow the City to implement the comprehensive

plan and ensure that it meets the goals and objectives established by the plan. It presents an opportunity to make the ordinance more user-friendly, incorporate best practices and address any outdated terms and regulations.



Mercer County Community Federal Credit Union Partners with the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Authority to Provide a Low Interest Loan Program

Mercer County Community Federal Credit Union (MCCFCU) will be partnering with the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Authority (PHFA) and the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST) to provide a low interest loan program for residents who need to connect to the public sewer.

The impetus for the multi-agency collaboration with the City of Hermitage is the Hermitage Municipal Authority (HMA) sanitary sewer extension projects on North Neshannock Road, North Darby Road and South Darby Road. The HMA sewer extension project is scheduled for completion in mid-2020 and the residents will be required to connect to the municipal sewer within 90 days after the sewer project is complete.

The state program provides low interest loan funds for those in need to repair or replace individual on-lot septic systems or to connect to a public sewer system for the first time. MCCFCU staff went through an extensive, eight-month qualification

process to be able to assist the community residents by providing local administrative services on behalf of PHFA. Sandi Carangi, Chief Executive Officer, MCCFCU commented "We're happy to be able to help our community by partnering with PHFA to offer this program."

The stimulus for this collaboration was the upcoming HMA projects in the City of Hermitage and all Mercer County community residents will benefit from this unique loan program. The program offers low interest loans for up to 20 years. The improvements made utilizing this program will eliminate deficient on-lot sewage systems, which in turn, will remove pollutants from the environment, improving the health and safety of residents and will increase the value of properties.

The terms of the loan program are:

- Interest rate of 1.75%
- Up to 20-year terms
- Maximum loan amount is \$25,000

Roberta Schwalm, Manager of Special Initiatives, PHFA, visited the city the week of September 16th and met with the MCCFCU staff, contractors and residents to discuss the particulars of the PHFA / PENNVEST program. Ms. Schwalm added "At PHFA, we know that connections to a public sewer, or repairing a home septic system, can be costly. That's why we worked with PENNVEST to create this loan program – to help lessen the burden on homeowners."

Everyone counts. The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once, and in the right place.

It's about fair representation. Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.

It's about redistricting. After each census, state officials use the results to redraw the boundaries of their congressional and state legislative districts, adapting to population shifts.

here. The first census was in 1790.

From the Chief of Police

Traffic Safety Tip:

Tragically, distracted driving kills and injures drivers, passengers, pedestrians, motorcycle riders and

bicyclists everyday in America. Distractions such as eating, smoking, adjusting the radio, talking to passengers, reaching for something, grooming, 'rubbernecking', etc. are traditional causations of inattentive driving crashes. These momentary distractions take drivers' eyes and minds of the road just enough to prevent one from seeing or recognizing a slowing or stopped vehicle ahead, a red light, speed zone reduction, a stopped school bus with flashing red lights on, a pedestrian in a crosswalk, a work zone, a curve in the road ahead, a school zone or other traffic or safety hazard.

Now add the latest and most concerning distracted driving cause - texting while driving. Most people of driving age have cell phones with texting capabilities. Many people feel the immediate need to reply to a text just received, and it causes some motorists to feel the need to type/send and read texts while driving. Texting while your vehicle is in motion will shorten your reaction gap (distance and time) between your vehicle and a hazard. In some cases an otherwise avoidable hazard is never realized by a texting driver until the crash.

Pennsylvania Vehicle Code Section 3316(a) says in part "No driver shall operate a motor vehicle on a highway or trafficway in this Commonwealth while using an interactive wireless communications device to send, read or write a text-based communication while the vehicle is in motion." Many drivers use stop lights at intersections to quickly read and respond to a text. Some drivers start texting as they begin slowing down in traffic for a light ahead, and others attempt to finish and

send their text while pulling away from the intersection after the light changes to green. Some drivers stopped at intersections get so distracted by texting they don't realize the traffic light has been green until the sound of the horn of the vehicle(s) behind them.

If your vehicle is moving, do not read or write texts. The best practice is to pull over (stop) at a safe location if you must read or send a text. If a safe pull off is not available, wait and send your message after you arrive at your destination. The law does allow you to make or answer a voice call.

Crime Prevention Advice:

Running or walking on our streets and roadways is great exercise enjoyed by many in all City neighborhoods. Below are some common sense safety tips to make your jaunt a little more safe.

- Don't exercise alone if possible. Find a partner or a group to exercise with as there is better safety in numbers.
- Run or walk facing traffic. Running/walking on the far left side of the road allows you to see oncoming vehicles to assess any potential danger.
- Change up your exercise course and time schedule regularly to avoid being place and time predictable.
- Ignore verbal harassment to prevent unwanted badgering from escalating into a physical confrontation.
- Don't wear visible expensive jewelry to reduce the risk of being targeted for robbery.
- Don't run or walk at nighttime. If you must run or walk at night, wear highly visible colors and/or light-reflective material. Carry a flashlight too.
- Know locations along your route you can go to in an emergency. Having predetermined safe havens to flee to could be life saving.
- Tell someone or at home write down your route, direction of travel and start time. This gives police a starting point and time frame if they have to look for you.
- Music motivates and passes time but tunes out your surroundings. Always be aware of your surroundings including sound. Don't wear headphones or

earbuds. If you must wear earbuds, wear just one.

- Carry some form of identification on you so police know who you are should you be incapacitated.
- Bring a cell phone to summon help and a whistle or alarm to scare away an aggressive animal or would be attacker.

And just one more thing....

From the Fire Chief's Desk

John R. Flynn, City of Hermitage, Fire Marshal-Chief



The volunteer fire service is facing a crisis. The number of volunteers is dwindling across the nation. Departments all over the

country are struggling to balance high call demand with low staffing. The most striking example has been in our state. In the 1970's, PA had 300,00 volunteer firefighters and now we are down to 38,000 volunteer firefighters in its ranks. More than 90% of PA's 2,400 fire companies are volunteer based. The Hermitage Volunteer Fire Department is an all-volunteer fire department facing the same crisis.

The City of Hermitage has a Fire Marshal's office within its community structure of Government. The office consists of a paid Fire Marshal, two paid Deputy Fire Marshals, one fulltime and one part-time paid administrative assistant, and a paid maintenance person. The Fire Marshal is also the volunteer Fire Chief and the two Deputy Fire Marshals are volunteer firefighters within the volunteer fire department. Part of their daily responsibilities is to respond to emergency calls, code enforcement, and handle non-emergency requests.

A residential house fire takes a minimum of 20 to 30 firefighters to safely and effectively extinguish the fire. On a larger commercial fire, that number could double or triple. The Hermitage Volunteer Fire Department needs your help. If you are a resident of Hermitage, 18 years of age, in good physical and mental health,

of sober and good moral character and have no adjudicated criminal background, we want you to strongly consider becoming a member of the department.

Who Are We?

Your neighbors, friends and maybe even your relatives make up the Hermitage Fire Department team. We are doctors, laborers, students, farmers, businessmen, nurses, carpenters, contractors, electricians, office workers, mechanics, husbands, wives, sons and daughters. We are people just like you with families, jobs and active lifestyles who still find time to give back to our community. The Hermitage Fire Department offers a friendly environment for you to discover your capabilities and make the most of your investment in volunteering. The Hermitage Fire Department is seeking volunteers to increase its ranks to help us serve our community.

Why Volunteer?

Ask any volunteer firefighter why they accept the challenges they do, and they will tell you that they feel a need to help others and give back to their community. As firefighters work to fulfill their need to help others, they also meet the ever-growing needs of their community. When you join the Fire Service, you are joining a profession steeped in

tradition and you belong to a strong sister/brotherhood dating back to the beginning of time. Today you can walk into any firehouse in the country, tell them you are a firefighter and you instantly have this connection and shared sense of pride to something greater than yourself.

Firefighting is very demanding of an individual. Many hours of training are involved, requirements must be met, and regulations and standards are to be upheld. There is no monetary bonus or financial incentive to work harder. However, there is a reward... It comes from the pride the volunteer receives both individually and as part of a team. It comes in the form of a friendly handshake from a grateful citizen or a smile of gratitude.

When you see a child's face as they see the inside of a fire truck or see the flashing red lights while talking to one of the firefighters; the smile from a neighbor, friend, or family member in your community who thanks you for being a part of a thriving, valuable and irreplaceable community organization; many volunteers like the feeling they get when they help people in their time of need, and some feel it's their obligation to serve the community; yet others just want to belong to the team. Whatever motivates you to volunteer, everyone gains the self-satisfaction of being at their best when others are dealing with what is often

Hello Everyone. I hope you enjoyed your summer. As a reminder, you may have noticed on your bills, the auditors have requested we have separate checks for all bills. To further explain, you may still combine "like" bills to one check, for example, **if you have more than one Per Capita bill, they may be combined to one check. The same holds true for multiple County/City bills as well as multiple School bills.** You can no longer combine any of the three to one check. They all have separate accounts and need to be paid with separate checks. The note on the bills seemed a bit confusing at first, but we want to thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

School Tax bills and your Per Capita bills were mailed on August 1st and are due at

the face amount from October 1st through November 30th. Penalty begins on December 1st. If you chose the payment plan for School taxes, the 2nd payment is due by October 31st and the 3rd one by December 15th.

Please bring in both sections of your bills if you are needing a receipt. If you mail your bill, kindly include both parts along with your self addressed envelope, and we will gladly return your stamped half as your official receipt.

Please notify us if you have not received your bills.

There is a partial exoneration from Per Capita if your annual income falls under \$10,000.00 from all sources. **You must come in to the office with proof of all income each**

year to receive any exoneration.

Anyone moving to or from Hermitage should notify our office to either add you to our Per Capita and census or remove you as needed. All residents over the age of 18 are required to pay the Per Capita Tax.

Sanitary Sewer Expansion Project & Food Waste to Energy Facility News

North Neshannock Road/North Darby Road/South Darby Road Sewer Expansion Project

This project, to extend low-pressure sanitary sewers to serve properties and alleviate malfunctioning on lot systems in these areas of the City, is anticipated to be under construction in the late winter and early spring of 2020. Once construction is ready to begin, the Hermitage Municipal Authority and the City will provide updated information to property owners regarding construction details, when connections to the new system can be made, contractors licensed to make connections and other related information.

Food Waste to Energy

Food waste continues to roll into the Food Waste to Energy facility at the Broadway Road treatment plant. This facility produces

electricity that ultimately offsets electricity costs of operating the wastewater treatment plant that serves the City of Hermitage as well as parts of South Pymatuning Township, Clark Borough, Jefferson Township, Shenango Township and Wheatland Borough. A typical month has 400 to 500 tons of waste food products processed through the Food Waste to Energy facility. These products are diverse and have included expired dairy products, inedible fruits and vegetables, bulk dog food, cheese, sauces and purees, meatballs, condiments, and the list goes on. These items, normally trucked to and deposited in a landfill, are being used by our facility to create energy by cooking the waste to generate methane gas, which is then converted to electricity.

Watch for our new logo on department vehicles as new vehicles come into the fleet.

Sewer Bill Credit Card & eCheck Payments

On September 3, 2019, the City of Hermitage implemented a 3.5% processing fee for all credit card payments and a .50-cent processing fee for all eCheck payments made through the City's website.

Please remember, the City no longer accepts payment at the counter for sewer bills.

The City provides our customers several options when it comes to remitting payment for sewer bills:

1. Direct Debit by EFT. Direct Debit authorization forms are available on the City's website at www.hermitage.net or at the City of Hermitage Municipal Offices. Payments are deducted on the 5th of the month or the next business day in the event

- the 5th falls on a weekend and/or Holiday.
2. Mail your payment to the City of Hermitage lock box. Envelopes provided with customers sewer bills. Please include remittance stub with your payment to ensure your payment is properly processed.
3. Deposit your check (No Cash) in the drop box located outside the City of Hermitage Municipal offices, at the north-end of the back parking lot. Again, we do not accept cash payments in the drop box.
4. Online bill pay options through your personal bank. Account or customer ID number must be included with each payment entered. It can take up to seven (7) days for payments to process.
5. Online payment through the City of

Hermitage's website (www.hermitage.net) by credit card, debit card, or eCheck. Please click the 'Pay Now' button from the City of Hermitage's home page to submit payment for sewer bills or other general bills. It is highly recommended to view our site using Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome or Safari. Customers can also submit payment through the City of Hermitage's mobile app (CivicMobile – Apple store/Hermitage PA Connect – Google play store)
